NO CANADIAN WOUNDED IN THE CONVOYS.

LONDON, Sept. 26.—Although a large number of wounded have arrived at the Canadian and other military hospitals, there have, so far, been no Canadians in the convoys. A wounded Lancashire man in Burlington hospital told the Montreal Gazette correspondent that his regiment in Kitchener's new army had shown wonderful pluck when the first test came, last week. The Germans had been greatly astonished at the way in which, under heavy artillery fire on the trenches, the British had swarmed over the parapets for the attack. The German prisoners had also expressed amazement at the fierceness of the bombardment made by the British in preparation for the attack.

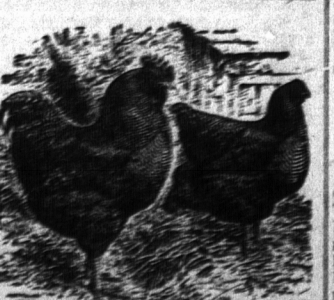

METHODISTS IN CONFERENCE

ST. JOHN'S, Oct. 1.—The special committee of the N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist conference met in Centenary church on Tuesday evening. Rev. Richard O'Connell presiding. It was decided to hold the next session at Summerside, from June 4-11, 1916, and that each member pay a registration fee of not more than three dollars, if necessary, to meet expenses. A resolution was adopted recommending that the conference financial year end on May 15, instead of May 31, as at present. A communication from the meeting of district Sunday school superintendents asking that consideration of Sunday school matters be given a more prominent place in the conference program, was read and referred to the committee on conference arrangements.

A communication from the General superintendent, Rev. S. D. Chown, D. D., re the spiritual condition of the church in this time of great stress, was read, and on motion the president was asked to prepare a suitable reply. The conference standing missionary committee reported the resignation of one of its members, Rev. H. E. Thomas, and on motion the resignation of Mr. Thomas was accepted, and Rev. W. H. Barnardough was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The secretary read the report of the General Committee of the Superannuated Fund, on the ballot taken by the Maritime Conferences, on the question of increased representation on that committee as follows:

The following members were added to the said committee, for N. B. and P. E. I. conference, Rev. Geo. Steel and J. Hunter White.

A resolution was unanimously adopted that the annual conference special committee in holding its special committee reports the action of the superannuated Fund Committee in holding its annual meeting at such an early date as to preclude the attendance of members of the enlarged committee, and that the small committee should have proceeded to transact the business of the annual meeting and adjourn without having taken definite action to complete the effort to raise such an amount as would enable the fund to pay the full allowance due to the superannuated ministers.

Arrangements were made to supply the vacant charges and authority given the board of trust to make any necessary expenditure in securing legal advice in regard to the Nichol property at West Devon on the Albertson circuit.

SIR R. BORDEN TALKED TO TEN THOUSAND PEOPLE IN TORONTO

"In all the democracies especially those of the British group, the people are looking to their leaders as they never did before. They await the breaking of the seal that is kept on official lips, and the communication of their thoughts in regard to some of the facts that would give the best satisfaction at home, and they can give no rein to a propensity to forecasting. Mr. Asquith, Lord Kitchener, Mr. Balfour and other members of the British government do give crumbs of comfort in their speeches, but seldom more. They are ALWAYS ON THE GUARD AGAINST ENLIGHTENING THE ENEMY AS TO THE SITUATION or as to intentions, and they still feel it to be their duty to rouse rather than cheer the people.

No head of a government is listened to with more attention at the present time than Sir Robert Borden by the Canadian people. He ONE SEES SO LARGE A KNOWLEDGE OF CANADA'S PART IN THE WAR, for no one else has had so large a hand in it as he. Before the war began, before any of the other overseas countries of the Empire made any overture in regard to it, he called to the government in London assurances of Canada's readiness to do everything in its power to aid the Mother country should she be drawn into the struggle. From that time HE DEVOTED HIMSELF TO THE TASK OF MAKING CANADA A POWERFUL AUXILIARY in the field. Now he is able to announce that there are 31,000 Canadian troops on the other side of the Atlantic and 4,000 others under arms here. He is strong public desire to hear him speak on war matters. It was to give the public of this city to hear him that the Central Liberal Conservative Association of Toronto arranged to have him address a patriotic meeting last night in the Arena Gardens.

The speech was a statement in the very best manner of the extent of Canada's co-operation, OF THE GLORIOUS PART PLAYED BY CANADA'S TROOPS, of the heroism and sacrifices of men and country is proud to call its sons. It was a fine human speech. But Sir Robert takes little satisfaction in speechmaking. As he says, this is a time not to TALK, and especially not to criticize

and point out mistakes, but to DO things, and he asks that all do their best to strengthen Canada's arm against the enemy. Coming from a statesman so constitutionally prone to under-estimate and aware of existing false hopes, Sir Robert's statement that in his opinion steps which are now being taken will effect all that is desired in the way of victory is certainly encouraging. He speaks very hopefully. Victory he considers assured if we ALL do our duty. BUT THE WHOLE RESOURCES OF THE EMPIRE ARE NEEDED. He favours the idea of a great national memorial to the Canadians who gave their lives for the defence of the Empire, and he promises that the men who are disabled will be looked after by the government. The speaker will give a new impulse to recruiting.
