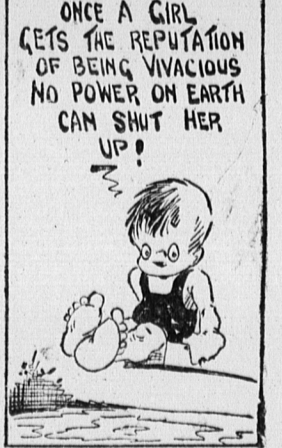
Machado Family Will Be Reunited Today In Mt'l.
