MADRID, March 11—The Spanish cabinet, which was re-organized in April, 1911, resigned today. This action was due to a conflict of opinion which arose between the minister of public works, Senor Gasset, and other members of the cabinet, resulting in the resignation of Senor Gasset. Premier Canalejas then decided that a complete reconstruction of the ministry was necessary. The king assured the premier of his interrupted confidence and gave him a free hand to arrange his cabinet as he deemed fit.

OTTAWA, Mar. 9—Hon. Frank Cochrane intends to make a thorough personal examination of the railways and canal systems of Canada during the coming summer. This is something which no other minister of railways and canals has ever attempted, the result being that previous holders of the portfolio have been largely dependent upon their departmental officials and upon more or less interested agents for their knowledge of local conditions.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane will, if time permits, cover the ground from Prince Rupert to the Atlantic, inspecting the larger rail line and terminals and the various links in the chain of canals connecting the waterways of Canada. A good deal of his tour will be in the west. It is not yet certain when he will be able to start, but the probability is that he will get away early in the summer.
