BELGIAN CHILDREN. Parents share their Pleasures with Offspring. This delight in the family life is characteristic of all Belgians. One sees in Brussels and Antwerp monsieur promenading in the boulevard or the boys with a cigar in his mouth, madame leaning on his arm and the children, hand in hand, walking sedately under the proud eye of their parents. One finds children in the restaurants and children in the music halls. "The pleasures of father and mother are shared always with the nursery. To go junketing without the children would appear to the Belgian not only selfish but dull. His happiness is the happiness of his children. He sees the circus half with his own eyes and half with theirs. The toyshops and bookshops in Brussels tell of the paramount part played by the child. The happiness of this people is the pleasure of domesticity.

More Widows than Widowers. The proportion of remarriages shows an almost continuous decrease, says the registrar-general in his report on the births, deaths and marriages in England and Wales during 1909. The number of widows, he states, is always much greater than that of widowers because in the first place men marry later in life than women; secondly, because the duration of male life is shorter than that of female life; and thirdly, because the proportion of widows who remarry is much lower than the proportion of widowers who remarry. Marriages of persons described as divorced have steadily increased and in the year 1909 were the highest on record.

ARE THE MEN THE WEAKER SEX? Women Gaining Muscular Supremacy. A college professor expresses the conviction that women are gaining the muscular supremacy over men. He attributes this to their taking a more active interest in outdoor sports. While the men are becoming indolent in that respect, and prefer being spectators to participants in athletic exercises. With their admitted superiority in all the arts and graces, including fluency of expression, and to add to this physical predominance, there seems to be little left for mere man but to plod unostentatiously along in the ranks of the producers, and continue to pass up his gross earnings to his mental and physical superior every Saturday.

MEASURES MINDS WITH MACHINES Wonderful Apparatus Devised by an English Scientist. A Mr. John Gray has devised a mind measuring apparatus, and among the persons already tested by him are Lord Avebury, Sir William Crookes, professors and physicians of the West London and Middlesex hospitals, and one of the women of the Lyceum Club. Commenting on the results of these tests, he says that, generally speaking, he found the men, with the exception of the actor, came under class V of the scale of persistence, which includes men of thorough and profound thought. What a dramatic critic Mr. Gray would have made! He found the literary women to be more mentally brilliant, witty and quick of apprehension than the average. Then Mr. Gray takes another whack at the actor by saying he came under class II, which comprises only persons who do not go into the depths of things and only learn superficially. The apparatus consists of a box, the interior of which is fitted with a revolving mirror, on which powerful colored lights are made to play. The eye of the person to be tested is placed against a whole in the side of the box, the mirror is set in motion, and the length of time taken for the sensation of flickering to disappear from the subject measures his mental persistence, thus giving indication of his intelligence.

A Year Ahead of His Time. Luxembourg was not so long ago the scene of an incident savoring decidedly of comic opera. When the late ruler of the Grand Duchy was Duke of Nassau he was officially informed of the death of his cousin, the King of the Netherlands, and promptly journeyed from Vienna to Luxembourg, to which state he was next in succession owing to the operation of the Salic law. A ceremonial entry was made into the capital, and the new Grand Duke had already received personal congratulations from many of his most prominent subjects, when he heard that King William's physicians had been misled by a cataleptic trance, and that, so far from being dead, he was on the road to recovery. So Duke Adolphus had to return to Vienna, and when, a year later, the King really passed away, several weeks elapsed before the new ruler of Luxembourg assumed the reins of government.

A Trick of the Sun. Upon a mountain in Andalusia quaint spectral forms are frequently seen. Whenever there is a heavy mist and persons are ascending the mountain they appear in all their ghostly splendor and sometimes so suddenly as to strike dismay into the hearts of those who see them for the first time. Of course it is all a trick played by the sun. When the mist partly shrouds the mountain the sun is naturally obscured, and then he revenges himself by projecting the shadow of any person who is ascending the mountain until it assumes the form of a gigantic spectre.

A Talented Arbitrator. Ralph Connor is a Man with a First-Hand Knowledge of Men. Rev. Charles W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) of Winnipeg, the famous novelist, who has been appointed Chairman of the Board of Conciliation which will seek to settle the big strike of coal miners in the West, is noted for his tolerance. That quality stands out strongest among his characteristics as a man, a minister, and a writer. As good an example of this as can be found is an amusing incident in his novel, "The Forester". "It does, your lordship," answered Sam. "But the brutes won't pull half their own weight without I speak to them in the way they are used to." More time passed. Then the bishop gave in.
