The Minto arrived yesterday at 10.40 a. m. with the following cargo: 8 cars hay, 1 car freight 15 passengers, and 125 bags mail.

A freight car was accidentally shunted the length of itself into the freight shed on the Railway wharf last night. The car was loaded, no one was injured.

The horse of John Lawlor, Sparrows Road became frightened at the mail special and ran over the head of the ferry wharf. Mr. Lawlor remained on the sleigh. The drop was about six feet. He was at once taken to Dr. Stewart and upon examination it was found that no bones were broken but the muscles of the back were badly strained. Mr. Lawlor was unable to walk and was conveyed on the sleigh. A report was current on the streets last evening that he had expired at Montague but a telephone message from there contradicted this statement.

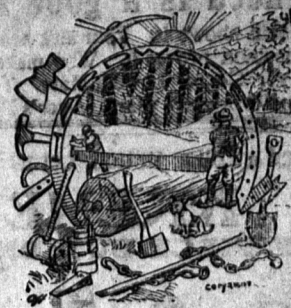
