Building Activity in Prince County

Several important building projects are in operation throughout Prince County at the present time. A new church for the Roman Catholic congregation at Summerfield, of which Rev. Frank MacDonald is the pastor is in course of erection. The edifice will be of frame construction in B. C. style with birch and spruce flooring and concrete foundation. The church is being built from plans by Messrs. Chappell & Hunter and will probably cost in the vicinity of \$20,000. Mr. Wm. Hennessey is in charge of the general work. The plumbing and heating was awarded to T. Johnston & Co., Summerside.

Another new Roman Catholic church edifice is in course of construction at Borden of which Rev. Wm. Monaghan is the pastor. It is a 70 x 40 frame building on a concrete foundation, and will be electrically lighted and finished within in B. C. style. It is also being built from plans by Chappell & Hunter, the work being done by day labor.

At Kensington an important work has been in progress in the remodeling of the United Church there from plans by the same architects. The work is being done by day labor and will make a decided improvement in the structure.

A new church is also being built for the United Church congregation at Arlington, Lot 14. It will be a building 30 x 50 feet constructed from plans prepared by Mr. Percy Tanton, Summerside. Mr. W. H. Phillips is in charge of the work which is a day labor job.

At Long River, a new church for the United Church congregation is in progress. It is of frame structure 30 x 51 feet made from plans by Mr. Percy Tanton, Summerside. The interior is now being completed in B. C. style. Mr. Rutherford Cotton is the contractor.

At Kensington a new two story frame residence was erected for the manager of the branch there of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Mr. W. MacLean. The general contractor was Mr. Major Schurman of Summerside. This house is fitted up in first-class style with all conveniences.

A number of new residences are being built in Summerside in addition to other important work, including the remodeling of Epworth Hall in connection with the United Church, the remodeling of the Agricultural Building for offices and a warehouse for the United Church, B. J. Rayner and the remodeling of the building on Water Street formerly owned by Mr. Rayner and now to be the Summerside headquarters of the P. E. I. Telephone Co.
