It has been arranged that the S. S. City of London will continue to use the same berth as last season at the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co's wharf.

The Sackville Hockey Team on Tuesday night defeated the Ramblers of Amherst, champions of Nova Scotia, 2 to 0. This is the aggregation that a week ago challenged for the Stanley cup and refused to play the Abegweit, Island champions.

At the Police Court yesterday William Bradley, shoemaker and Wesley Snow were fined \$10 or one month and \$5 or one month respectively for annoying public worship at the Salvation Army Barracks. The Magistrate took occasion to warn future offenders that the full penalty would be imposed hereafter.

The annual meeting of the Condensed Milk Company was held at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms. The reports showed the past year to have been very successful. Haszard, President and E. R. Brow, Secretary.

While working on the machinery his arm was caught in the belt and had the belt not broken the lad would probably have been fatally mangled. DURING the past few weeks the engineer of the winter steamer Stanley has been considerably troubled with the leakage of the boilers of that boat which during the past two or three weeks has necessitated the constant presence of a boiler maker from Bruce Stewart & Co. on board. The leakage is in the back connections of the tubes of the boilers and prevents the high pressure which is an absolute necessity in the most effective severe ice fighting such as has been experienced this winter. The leakage, however will not prevent the Stanley from completing her service for the winter after which she will have to be fitted with new tubes. No blame seems to attach to the authorities in the matter thought at the time of the Stanley's overhauling at Pictou last year no examination was made. The previous year, however, was the Government Inspector, Douglas Stevens drew a number of the tubes and found them in such excellent condition that it was unnecessary to make further examination. These tubes were put in the boat when she left Scotland in 1888 and it is proof of the excellent workmanship that they have lasted till the present time.

TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE

Delegation and Mr. Peters.

SIR:—I was greatly surprised to read in The Examiner last Friday an article of a very misleading nature entitled "Enforcement of Our Laws," inspired evidently by some member of the Committee appointed by the Alliance to wait on Mr. Blanchard and Mr. Peters, whose zeal for the Conservative party is greater than his discretion. As an independent Conservative I think it but fair to Mr. Peters and Mr. Blanchard to deny some of the implied assertions in the above mentioned article. In the first place the committee only interviewed Mr. Blanchard and the reason that he gave for withholding the papers from Mr. Bears was that the Temperance Alliance of King's County were considering the question of having a new prosecutor appointed with greater zeal in the work than Mr. Bears has shown for the last few months, and therefore in Mr. Peters' opinion until the question of the appointment of a new prosecutor was settled it would not be wise to furnish papers to Mr. Bears. And on being asked why so few third offences were being tried, he said he was never asked for papers for a second or third offence, but what he furnished them and that he had always been willing to do his duty in helping Mr. Bears obtain convictions. That is the substance of Mr. Blanchard's answers to our questions. We then went to see Mr. Peters but could not find him owing to his wife's illness. Now until Mr. Peters had been interviewed and given a chance to explain matters it was I think to say the least very impolitic for any member of that Committee without the consent of the other members to inspire an article of censure on Mr. Peters in a party organ, especially an article misleading in its nature. In my opinion the worst obstacle in our task of annihilating the drink traffic is the readiness with which even the best of the temperance people sacrifice our temperance principles for the welfare of our political party. Now I do not wish this letter to be taken as an attempt to exonerate Mr. Peters for his non-enforcement of the law. I write it simply as a protest against judging him without a hearing and for party purposes.
