Black duck and teal are quite numerous in these localities, and hunters have been successful in taking quite a number. Fiquid Pond and Fortune are showing up well with quite large flocks moving in the morning and evening. Several hunters have been successful in bringing home one or two ducks each day, and some lucky ones were fortunate enough to get the limit on one or two occasions. Some geese have been seen and it is reported that they are flying in quantity in the northern section. One or two hunters have brought down the lone goose, but no large bags have been taken. This year has, for the general hunter, proved quite good, and it is hoped it will continue so until the end of the season.

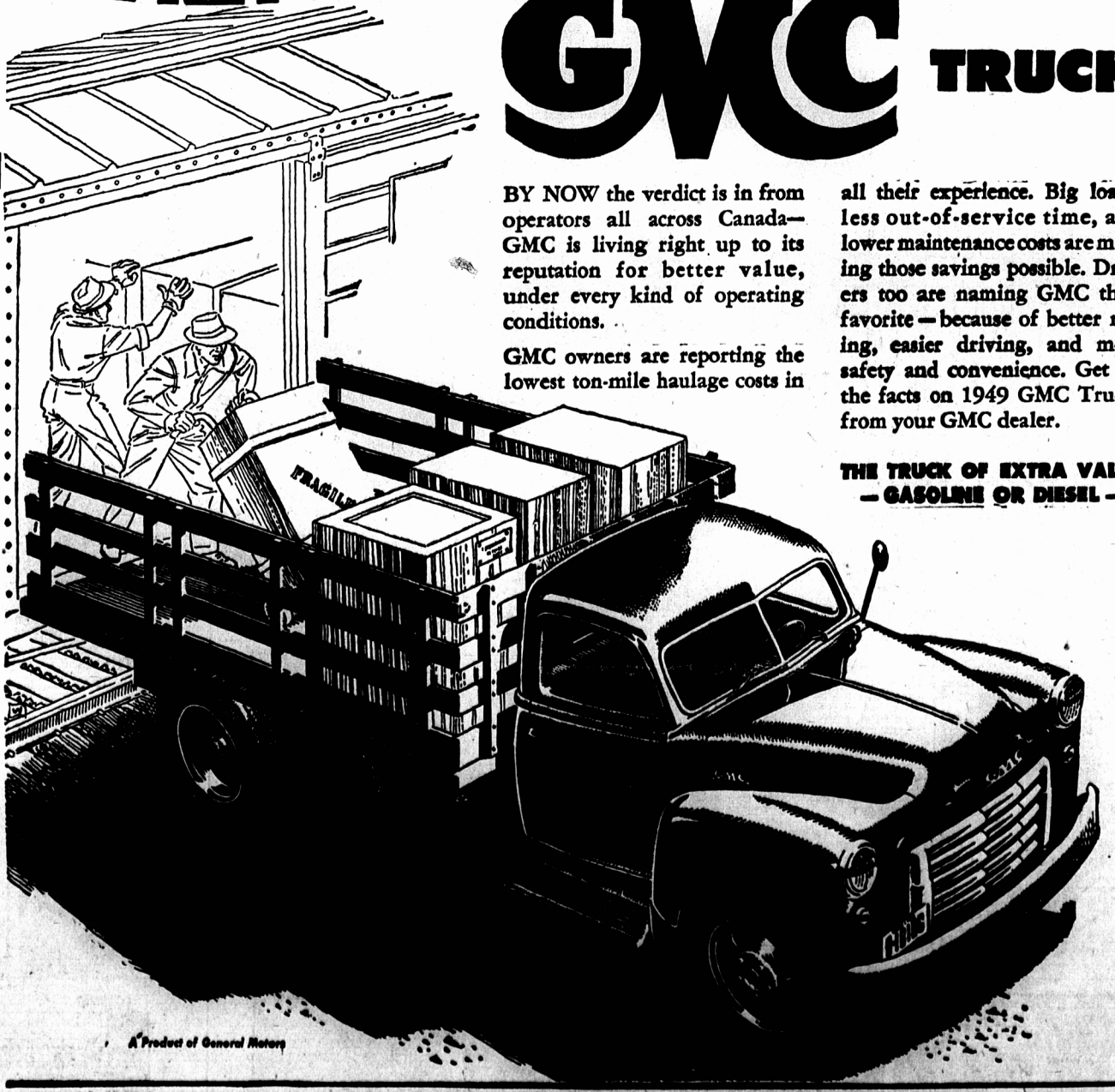
