HORSE NOTES.

The 2.30 trot for a purse of \$500 at White River Junction, Vt., Sept. 22, was really a duel between two members of the Blingen (2.064) family, viz.: Baden, by Bingara, and McQuillan (2.171), by Aquillin (2.193), although there were three other starters. McQuillan won first and second heats in 2.23, 2.23, but Baden took the next three in 2.19, 2.24, 2.24, with McQuillan the contending horse every trip. Baden was bred at Allen Farm. His dam was Kaldah, by Kremlin (2.074); second dam, Estaxia, by Expedition (2.151), etc. Baden (2.194) inherited three strains of the blood of the famous brood mare, Miss Russel. Baden is a very richly bred trotter. He appears in the summary as a gelding but he is registered in volume 17 of the American Trotting Register and his number is 43815. The four year old colt Baden (2.194) winner of the above race is out of Kaldah, sister of the trotting stallion Aquiri owned by J. M. Nicholson of this City. McQuillan (2.174) winner of second money is also a half-brother of Aquiri.
