U. S. May Need 7,000,000 Men

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—The United States is not only fighting the Kaiser and the Prussian military system but the German people, said former President Taft, in an address at the annual banquet of the Associated Industries of Massachusetts here to-night.

"We are not fighting the Kaiser and Prussian military system alone. We are fighting the German people, a people obsessed with megalomania and the only way we can win is by hitting the German people with a club."

Mr. Taft thought that to accomplish the defeat of the Germans the United States must send five to seven million of American soldiers to France.

He frankly declared that if the United States did not win the war the only alternative would be to make militarism the dominating policy of the government.

OUR MOTHERS (Farm and Dairy)

Homemaking as a profession is second to none. In the hands of mothers the world over, lie the destinies of nations. Not only are they dependent upon her for the boys and girls who in a few years will be the politicians, the captains of industry, the professional men and the farmers, but upon the training which these boys and girls receive in their homes, will depend the status of health, morality and religion throughout the world. And if mother is to live up to her responsibility to civilization in training her family, she must have her task well in hand.

There is perhaps no other profession in which so many details must be looked after. And every detail is important. In order that everything may get its share of attention, homemakers should carefully plan their work. If women will but stop and consider each department of the home, they will probably find that in order to give everything its proper share of their attention, some things will have to be cut down. It is to give the training of their children and time for social, church and community duties that labor saving devices must be instituted if we are to get the greatest efficiency from the home.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THIS sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must reside in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the District. Entry by 1913 can be made at any Dominion Lands Agency on such Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, and cultivation of the land in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Livestock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

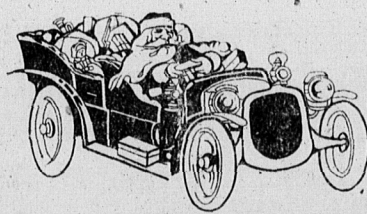
