

ROUSING CONVENTION AT GEORGETOWN HALL YESTERDAY

Messrs J. D. Stewart and J. H. McDonald Nominated Amid Great Enthusiasm. The Conservative Platform Announced by Mr. Stewart in Able Address. Other Speakers Were Messrs McDonald, Dr. McMillan and W. C. S. McLure.

At a largely attended convention and was listened to throughout the Liberal Conservative electors of the Fifth District of Kings County held yesterday afternoon at Georgetown Mr. J. D. Stewart, K.C., the Conservative leader, and Mr. J. H. McDonald were unanimously nominated to contest the election. The meeting was most enthusiastic, there being practically a full representation from every ward.

At the conclusion of the speeches able addresses were given by Mr. Stewart, Mr. McDonald, Dr. MacMillan and Mr. W. C. S. McLure. Mr. Stewart in his speech announced the Conservative platform, which appears in full below.

Mr. E. M. McLaren presided at yesterday's meeting, the secretary being Mr. Michael Murphy. A special committee was appointed, consisting of the chairman of each poll.

Mr. Stewart's nomination for councillor, moved by Mr. Maurice Murray (Hudson North) seconded by Mr. A. Corrigan, Georgetown, and supported by the unanimous vote of the meeting, the nomination was then tendered Mr. McDonald.

Mr. Stewart received an enthusiastic ovation as he stepped forward to the platform. During the course of his speech, he fully reviewed the political situation and the broken promises of the present government, in addition to the present day's election.

He expressed the pleasure he felt at again addressing the electors of the Fifth District and thanked them for the splendid support given him at the last election. The Fifth Kings has always been a Conservative district, and there are no more loyal or more high committment workers anywhere in Canada.

Mr. Stewart was glad also to have the opportunity of speaking before lady voters, whose part in the coming campaign will be no small one. The women of this Province abhor infidelity, whether it be in private or public life, and the fell sense that they resent, even more strongly than do the men of the Province, the broken promises of the Bell government.

In 1908 in Georgetown the then Conservative leader, now Chief Justice Matheson, enunciated his platform and when he was returned to power that platform was implemented. Every promise made was carried out to the letter. This has been the history of the Conservative party from the beginning and he trusted that it would continue so. On the other hand, the Liberal party since its return to power in 1919, has broken practically every promise made. Mr. Stewart was frequently applauded.

NO BOUQUETS TENDERED AT THE BEDEQUE MEETING

There was Bitter Controversy Over the Nomination of Premier Bell and Hon. W. M. Lea, at the Liberal Convention Yesterday. Several Delegates Walk out in a Body.

Amid open hostility from several of the duly appointed delegates Premier Bell and Hon. W. M. Lea, the Commissioner of Agriculture, received Liberal nominations for the Fourth District of Prince at the Liberal convention held yesterday at Bequeque. This hostility showed itself in emphatic speeches by the delegates particularly against the nomination of Premier Bell. Two other nominations for the Premier's constituency, those of Robert Agnew and seconded. It was announced that Premier Bell was Agnew and Thos. Moyle, were the nominee but the result of the vote was not given.

Kearns Expresses Satisfaction With Dempsey's Training
