MR. J. H. BUNTAIN ON BUDGET DEBATE

Speaking on the Budget Debate in the Provincial Legislature, April 11th, Mr. J. H. Buntain, Conservative member for the East Queen's, said he had no intention of taking up very much time, as he thought his few remarks on the Budget would be sufficient. However, as a representative of Second Queen's he felt it incumbent upon him to express the best of his ability the feelings of his constituency.

Listening to the various speakers who had preceded him, Mr. Buntain felt that there must surely, somewhere, be a blunder. He did not think he had ever heard or read in the Legislature so many conflicting remarks. He could not understand the hon. members in the Opposition making such fabrications. He recalled that in 1911, the first time he had engaged in politics, there was great agitation throughout the country. The Liberals at the time were in power. The Conservative Government of the day had left the country in and the feeling that existed among the electorate. In fact the agitation was so great that as a result of the election of 1911 the Liberals went out with only two survivors to tell the tale. The Conservatives came in and held office until 1919, and during that time the taxes they placed on the people were so small that they were really almost forgotten by the electors. But in 1919 a strange thing occurred.

Mr. Buntain remembered speaking to the Premier at the time and heard him make a statement that he felt it was almost impossible to run the affairs of the Province with the small revenue at his disposal. We know that a great many of the people realized the position, and that the Premier was, as it were, on the horns of a dilemma. In order to extricate himself he appealed to the people for an additional \$75,000 in order to meet the demand of the teachers for increased salaries. Every reasonable man in the House and out of it knew this. But the then Opposition made a great outcry through the country that there was too much extravagance. Premier Arsenault was recognized as being one of the ablest men the Province has produced, a man who was an honor to his profession and to the leadership of the Legislature and Government. But he was defeated by the Liberal Government and against him with one of the most ridiculous platforms ever framed. Every member of the Legislature knew it was absolutely necessary that more money be secured by way of revenue, yet every member in the Opposition fought against that. They were extravagant; that they were spending money foolishly and that they were unable properly to conduct the affairs of the Province.

On their promises that they could run the country on the then existing revenue the Liberals went into power. And was there ever anything so corrupt? Those men, with a reputation to earn for themselves, came in, and with feelings better imagined than described, came forward and said: "We can't make ends meet either." They violated every principle of honor. They had made statements to the country that were false, yet there was no appeal to the people to rectify their misdeeds. They must take the responsibility for that. They formed a Government whose whole ambition it was to legislate, not only in their own interests but in the interest of their friends. One of the first things they did was to raise the taxes against the hard-working farmers, and as a result there were indignation meetings all over the country. Men refused to pay the taxes, which had been raised from 20 cents on the \$100 to 50 cents. Then they put on the Poll Tax which the Opposition members have the audacity to stand up and support today. Instead of paying \$2, as under the Conservatives, the poor farmer had to pay \$3, \$10, and in some cases \$12 in Poll Taxes. Worse than that, many of them in order to gratify their own pecuniary ambitions, deliberately, by virtue of their being members of private corporations, undertook to place the public money into those corporations, and by so doing put some of it in their own pockets. If this was true Mr. Buntain was prepared to retract it, but it was common talk among the people at the time.

On behalf of the farmers the speaker wished to compliment the present Government. He believed that for honesty, integrity and honor, no worthier leader could be found than Premier Stewart. He could pay the same sincere compliment to the Ministers of Public Works and Agriculture. In their speeches they have elucidated the questions and problems pertaining to their respective offices, and their records cannot be contradicted by any members of the Opposition. (Applause.)

Our Province is all farming country and we cannot, like our neighbors in other provinces, look for wealth in coal mines, lumber, gold, factories, etc. We must depend very largely on agriculture alone, and as an agricultural Province we are in the unfortunate position of having to purchase elsewhere, with our hard-earned money, the necessities we require. In doing so we place into the treasuries of other provinces the revenue which is so badly needed here.

It is quite evident, Mr. Buntain believed, that the present Minister of Agriculture has done everything in his power to bring about greater prosperity to the farmers of the Province. In everything that he has taken hold of he seems to have succeeded admirably. The Egg Cycles today are in a better position than ever before. Wished They Did Not Carry Cattle

OTTAWA, May 10.—Testifying before the Ocean Rates Committee yesterday J. P. Böherty, traffic manager of the Canadian Government Mercantile Marine, admitted to H. J. Symington, K. C., counsel for the Committee that while four vessels of the fleet had been converted into cattle boats, there were times when the management wished it did not carry cattle.

Mr. Symington questioned the witness at length with respect to the loss of revenue sustained by the system in the carriage of cattle as against other more profitable cargoes. The approximate loss per voyage per boat he said would be over \$600. After other expenses were considered the Company on a \$20 rate had only \$11 per head as against operations.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS COVERING SOILGRO

What is Soilgro? It is a scientific culture of various soil bacteria.

What does it do? It changes the elements in or added to the soil into available plant food.

What effect has it on the plants? By increasing the available plant food, it promotes a sturdier and faster growth, better root development, more extensive yield and quicker maturity.

Can it injure or burn the plants? No, it merely increases the natural functions. You cannot use too much.

Can it be used on all kinds of plants? Yes, it may be used with advantage on trees, grains, vegetables, shrubs, flowers, lawns and pastures.

Must fertilizer be used with Soilgro? Not necessarily, but the function of Soilgro is to supply the bacteria necessary to make the plant food now in the soil available for use by the plant and the more added, in the way of fertilizer or manure, the better.

How often should it be applied? It cannot be applied too often. Once a season, but successive applications will tend to increase growth and hasten maturity.

Is humus necessary when Soilgro is used? Yes, humus is necessary as this provides sponges in the soil which retains moisture and no plant life will exist without moisture.

Must it be applied every year? It can be with advantage. Under favorable conditions the bacteria build a reserve supply of plant food but if the plants are assimilating it and increasing their productivity rapidly, it is advisable to provide all-the food they may require.

How should Soilgro be mixed? Empty the bacteria food first and pour contents of Soilgro can onto it and then add five times the amount of the Soilgro can, of clear water, (rain water preferable, but not necessary.) Stir well and cover with cheese cloth or mosquito netting. Let stand in a warm shady spot for five days. Do not expose to the direct rays of the sun as sun rays affect the life of bacteria.

Why do you have to mix it as directed? This releases the bacteria from captivity in air tight cans and provides food on which they thrive and multiply.

Can part of contents only be mixed? Yes, but it is better to mix it all at one time as it keeps better in that form.

Does Soilgro have a disagreeable smell? Only when first opened. As soon as the harmless gases that have formed in the can come in contact with the air, this odor immediately disperses.

Does it smell when applied to a lawn? No.

How long will it keep after mixing? From six to eight months.

Will mixture evaporate? Not to any great extent.

Why should the mixture be covered with cheese cloth? Because mosquitos and other insects eat the Soilgro.

Why should Soilgro be applied in the evening or on a cloudy day? Because the direct rays of the sun will kill the bacteria before they have a chance to work into the soil.

Who discovered Soilgro? Dr. J. E. Davis, Ph.D., Oph.D., a Canadian chemist and bacteriologist.

Is it a new principle? No, it is rather a perfected method. Bacteria cultures have been used on legumes such as alfalfa, clover, vetches, beans, etc., for the past 15 or more years.
