—DEATH OF MISS BEARISTO.—The death of Miss Elizabeth Bearisto, of the Bearisto House, George street, took place about two o'clock this morning, after an illness of several weeks. —FOX ITEMS.—There has been a stir among foxmen recently, on account of some hunters capturing live foxes in traps. Should they be so fortunate as to trap a Silver Black Fox they do not have to wait long before receiving a visit from some unfortunate fox owner who has had the misfortune of losing one of his valuable animals. Accompanying him is a representative of the law, who by the authority given him by a search warrant, proceeds to break open the ranch, and take the animal in charge. The next step is to go before a magistrate, and if the claimant is willing to swear that the fox is his, it is immediately transferred to new quarters. When lads in times gone by were going to school they had an unwritten law, that any one finding a jack knife, or other articles, retained it until the owner came forward and gave an accurate description of it, together with some special mark.—A.

—DAIRY MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Egmont Bay Dairy-farming Association took place in St. Philip's Hall, Egmont Bay on Feb. 9th. The attendance was fairly large both Egmont Bay and Mt. Carmel being well represented. After the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted the report of the last year's transaction was read. Judging from the several remarks that were made in this connection the patrons were greatly satisfied. Remarks were also made in connection with the proposed butter plant at Wellington, but practically all were in favor of upholding the cheese factory. It is the opinion of the great majority in this section, that such an establishment as a butter plant at Wellington would be against the interests of the farmers.

The last year's report of the cheese factory was in brief as follows: The factory opened on May 29th and closed on October 18th, a term of 112 days' work. The quantity of milk furnished by 120 patrons was 735,443 lbs., and the quantity of cheese made was 69,662 lbs. Average amount of milk to one lb. of cheese was 10.55 lbs. Value of cheese manufactured was \$8919.42. Expenses (including \$134.40 being interest paid to stock holders) was \$1779.41. The money paid to patrons for their milk was \$7133.80 being 97 cts. per 100 lbs. Balance left in favor of Association, \$6.18. Average butter fat was 3.8; average cost of hauling milk 9.67 per 100 lbs.; average price of cheese sold \$12.77 per lb.; average cost of fuel, \$1,682. The president for the ensuing year is Stanislaus G. Gallant, Vice President, H. A. Darby; Auditor, Rev. S. Boudreau. The directors are the same as last year.—M.

—PASTORAL REPORT.—The annual reports of the pastoral charge of Kensington and New London North, P. E. I., shows that \$2900 were raised for the Missions of the Presbyterian Church.
