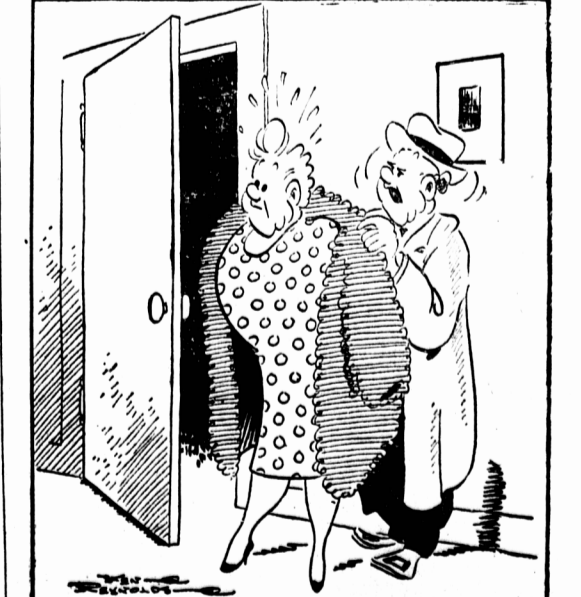
WILLIAM MacRIAY LARKIN

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Man-tested recipes

T. Phair, Toronto, says of the recipe below: "My wife prepared Braised Stuffed Pork Chops from your Heinz recipe. Believe me, I could take a lot of this dish before tiring of it."

Braised Stuffed Pork Chops
