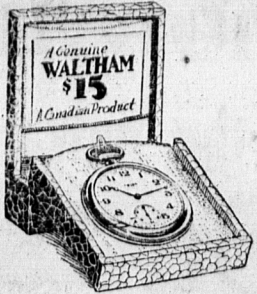

SAYS HE LOST \$500,000 AT CROOKED ROULETTE. PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 22.—Recovery of \$500,000 for losses at roulette is sought by Edward T. Bannon, a New Bedford attorney. He has brought suit in Federal District Court against six defendants, seeking \$100,000 each from Frank L. Murray of East Greenwich, and John F. Hennessey of East Providence, and \$75,000 each from Jacob I. Vogel and August S. A. Schaller of East Greenwich, Jas. E. Moran of Providence and Chas. L. Manchester, Jr., of Auburn, Bannan charges that the defendants, their agents, and their servants so controlled the roulette wheels at various Rhode Island resorts, where he played, that all element of chance was eliminated, thus enabling the defendants to win large sums of money from him.

This is a three year old mare by Mayor Todd and was her first start in fast company, as the first heat this mare tried, she finished behind the money she is a nice mare of high order, a smooth even handed pacer. She won the two grinding heats, finishing right in the time limit and was a factor in the reckoning with every foot on the way.

Class B. trot brought out four starters, namely, Colonel Aubrey, owned and entered by Gordon W. Brown, president of the Tryon Horse Breeders Association. This is a handsome big bay gelding, and promises to make another Bill Sharon and was much admired by horsemen and spectators.

Mr. Cox, one of the leading trainers and drivers handled the fifth heat, winning the second third and fifth heats and first money.

Search Light owned and entered by D. Walsh, winning the first and fourth heats, losing out in the fifth by inches, winning second money.

Smuggler, owned and entered by Louis H. Howatt. This horse, although suffering from a sprained tendon raced gamely, finishing up well and was a contender in every heat, winning third money.

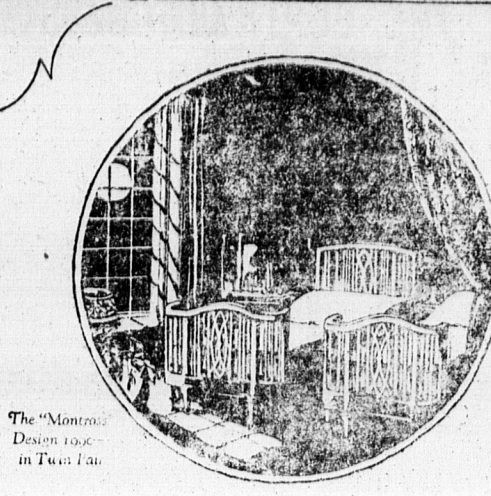
Lina Bell owned and entered by R. Down went a good race although short of work, made a good impression.

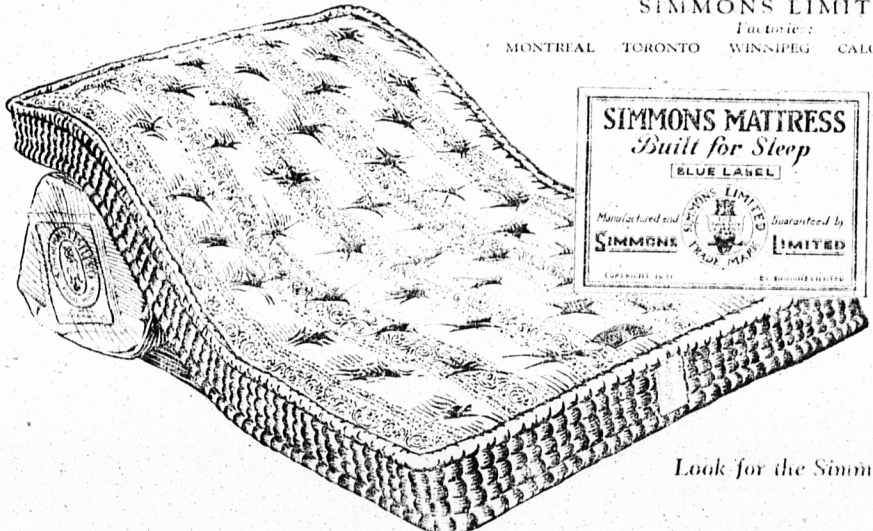
Several purses were paid in each class. The visiting horsemen were loud in their praise of the treatment accorded them and expressed their intention of coming again in the near future.

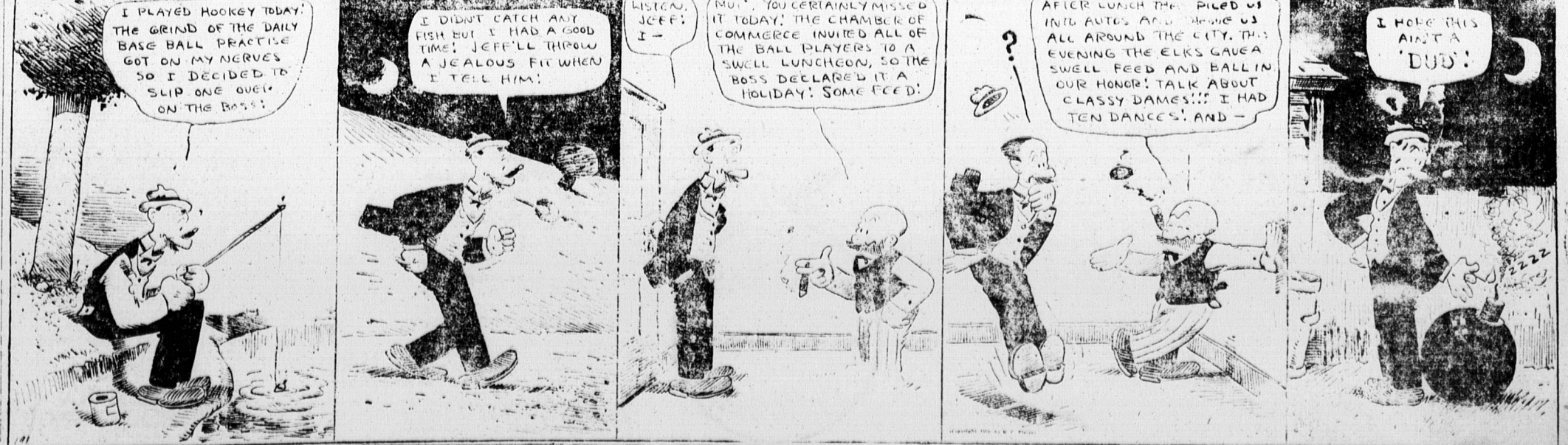
