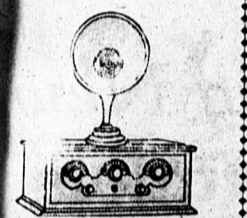

London Letter

THE OFFICE OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR CANADA IN LONDON. WEEK BY WEEK. 18th February, 1926.

Among the enquiries received at the Office of the High Commissioner for Canada, was one from a Swedish correspondent asking for information regarding the purchase in Canada of a sailing vessel of about 400 tons dead-weight. He also wished to be advised in regard to the Canadian regulations for taking out a Master's Certificate.

The steamship "Ontario" which was specially fitted up for the carriage of Canadian Cattle to the United Kingdom has been undergoing a number of alterations to effect improvements deemed necessary as the result of her recent voyages to Blackhead and Glasgow. The vessel left Glasgow on Tuesday and the owners believe that she will now meet all requirements.

An International Congress on Forestry is being organized by the Italian Government and is expected to meet in Rome next May. The Governments of the various Dominions have been invited to send delegates.

Owing to a recurrence of foot and mouth disease at Manchester it will probably be several weeks before the restrictions imposed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries upon the landing of Canadian Store Cattle can be removed. An outbreak has also occurred at Norwich which has been a favor to the industry for the distribution of Canadian Store Cattle.

During the past week two consignments of Canadian Store Cattle arrived at United Kingdom ports, the total number landed being 627. All the animals arrived in good condition.

The Press Bulletin circulated from the High Commissioner's Office this week dealt with the Sugar Refining Industry of Canada, the figures given being for the year 1924. From this Bulletin it appears that the seven factories reporting operations during the year had a total production of 87,000,000 lbs. worth \$5,000,000, mainly produced from imported cane raws. Exports of refined sugar during the year amounted to 81,000,000 lbs. worth \$7,400,000. Late figures for the year 1925 show that exports last year amounted to 3,652,000 lbs. worth \$19,000,000.

Items from the Natural Resources News Letter of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa were sent to the Editors of the grocery, clay, grain, for entry and timber, paper, cattle and air freight lists.

The High Commissioner's Office is informed by the Canadian Trade Commissioners in Great Britain that they have received the following enquiries for Canadian goods during the past week:—

A London Company ask to be placed in touch with Canadian Leather manufacturers who can regularly supply Dressed Horse Leather Shells or Crups suitable for cutting into Razor Straps. Samples and prices, c. l. f. United Kingdom port should be supplied and permanent business can be secured if quality and prices are competitive.

A London firm who anticipate being shortly in the market for large quantities of Wet Mechanical Pulp (50 percent dampness), Dry Mechanical Pulp, and also Yellow Mechanical Pulp, ask to be placed in touch with actual Canadian manufacturers who can quote for their requirements.

A London firm who purchase Canada Balsam regularly would be glad to receive offers, accompanied by sample and lowest quotations c. l. f. London, from actual Canadian producers.

A Glasgow man with experience in selling upon the retail ironmongery or hardware trade, and department stores, is open to consider as commission agency on behalf of Canadian firms.

A Bristol wholesale firm handling large quantities of radio equipment would like to hear from Canadian manufacturers who can offer various types of knock-down Radio Cabinets in small sizes.

A Manchester firm is interested in receiving offers from Canadian manufacturers of Ice Cream Freezers.

A firm of wholesale fruit merchants in Glasgow is open for a connection in British Columbia or other Canadian raw green fruit.

A firm of Brokers in Bristol desire to hear from Canadian packers who will in the future be in a position to ship unadmixed unbranded Bacon to the West of England.

The results achieved by the Experimental Farm Branch, Ottawa, with wheat "Gardner" wheat have aroused much interest in the United Kingdom. Applications have been received by the High Commissioner for Canada from persons who desire to obtain small quantities of the new seed for experimental purposes.

Three shipments of Canadian Store Cattle have been landed at United Kingdom ports within the past week, the total number of animals being 1,129.

The High Commissioner for Canada gave a small reception on Thursday, the 11th, in the Canadian Building, to meet members of the Canadian Carlin Team which came over to Scotland.

The High Commissioner for Canada, accompanied by the High Commissioners of Australia, New Zealand, and Newfoundland, is visiting the Channel or the Exchequer to discuss payments and general matters regarding reparations.

The High Commissioner for Canada has received from Ottawa copies of a call for tenders for subsidized steamship services between Canada, Bermuda, the British West Indies, British Guiana, and British Honduras, commencing within fifteen months of the date of ratification of the Canada-West Indies Trade Agreement of 1925. Tender forms may be obtained at the Canadian Building, Trafalgar Square.

The Glasgow market can absorb about 6,000 tons of Canadian hay annually. The superior flavour of the best Canadian hay creates a demand among horse owners and cartage contractors which permits Canadian hay to command a price of about 7s. 6d. a ton more than is obtained for the best Scotch hay. During 1925 shipments of about 500 tons were made by one Canadian exporter to a Glasgow firm, the connection having been established early in the year by the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Glasgow.

Items from the Natural Resources News Letter of the Department of the Interior were circulated during the week to the Editors of building, mining, cattle, paper, and other trade journals, and a bulletin was also sent out compiled from the recent electric Development in Canada during 1925.
