MORNING STOCK LETTER

NEW YORK, May 17—The London market is closed today. The Supreme Court will meet at 11 o'clock. Dividend meetings today include St. Joseph Lead, Hudson Bay Mining, Dupont, Humble Oil and Glidden. Glidden for six months ended April 30 showed \$1.82 against 80 cents in the corresponding period of last year. Saturday's market was a rather meaningless affair. There was a few strong spots and in view of the absence of any further important news over the week end we would expect some further irregular strength today in the rails, amusements, chemicals and some of the oils.

MONTREAL, May 17—Aluminum Co. of America—Temporary injunction blocking United States governments suit against Aluminum Company, final hearing to be held later.

Buffalo Ankerite—Net profit after development charges had been deducted equivalent to 30 cents per share for first quarter.

Gold Import: Into U. S.—During past week \$23,980,000 from England and \$5,200,000 from Japan and \$3,800,000 from India. On Saturday imports were \$2,800,000 of which \$2,200,000 were from Canada.

Pend Oreille—Plant operating at only 50 to 60 per cent of capacity until power project is completed with 60 days. Mill then expected

to operate at 800 tons daily and within two months thereafter to 1,000 tons.

Gypsum—March production of gypsum in Canada amounted to 23,352 tons against 5,329 a year ago and 4,827 tons in February.

Standard Oil of N. J.—Company reports net profit for 1936 equal to 3.73 per common share against 2.43 in 1935. Crude oil production increased 6.6 per cent and combined domestic and foreign crude oil runs showed increase 19.4 per cent over preceding year.

Newsprint Consumption—Report 431, U. S. publishers up 10.2 per cent, in 52 U. S. cities up 8.3 per cent.

Steel Production—U. S. Steel production at 91 per cent last week down one point from preceding week due chiefly to labor troubles.

Lake Shore Mines—Quarterly dividend of \$1 declared payable June 15 to record of June 1.

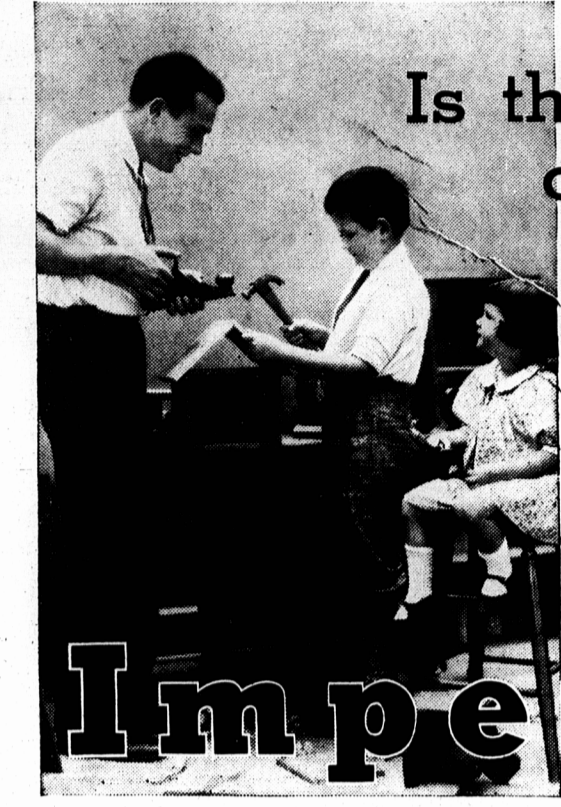

NEW YORK, May 17—Holiday in Great Britain today. U. S. Supreme Court meets at 1 p. m. New York time. Celanese Corp. declares dividend of 40 cents on common. Texas Gulf Producing Co. March quarter net profit 25 cents a share vs 23 cents in first quarter 1936. Glidden Co 6 months ended April 30 net profit \$1,683,254 or \$1.82 on common vs \$0.87, 75¢ or 80 cents in like period previous year. Net market purchases of government securities for investment accounts in April totalled \$1,856,500 vs \$1,955,000 in March. Elec output of 19 major utility systems in week ended May 3 shows increase of 4.7 per cent to 19.3 per cent over like 1936 week. MINING

TORONTO, May 17—(CP)—Decline in business was attended by a moderate price slump in the metals on the Toronto list today, but general strength in base metals and cheap oils gave the miscellaneous mines index an advance of .20 to 155.05.

Metal shares started the day well but the enthusiasm faded as the London market holiday and heaviness of the New York board were depressing influences. Noranda dropped 1-2 and the close was higher for Waite-Amulet, Sherritt and Sudbury Basin. Falconbridge and Hudson Bay held unchanged. Eldorado bulged to 2.75 in an early flurry and closed at 2.80, up 5 cents net.

A fairly strong tone was maintained by the oils. Gains of a few cents each were recorded for Vulcan, Model, Commonwealth and Highwood. Calgary-Edmonton was off 5 cents at the close. Royaltite was dormant.

The gold list was heavy at the close. McIntyre, Hollinger and Lake Shore were down. Read-Author finished with a loss of 30 cents and losses of 10 to 20 showed for Anglo-Huronian, Comstar and Kerr-Addison, Macassa, Pamour, Pickle Crow and Sladen. Bidgood-Kirkland led the board for volume with a turnover of 41,000 shares. It closed unchanged at 89 cents.

Grain

WINNIPEG, May 17—(CP)—Rains in Southern Saskatchewan and Alberta weakened wheat prices on the Winnipeg grain exchange in early trading today but most of the loss was recovered on late Chicago strength.

Values ended 1-2 cent lower to unchanged after a dull session that was void of export interest. May closed at \$1.30 3-8 July \$1.29 and October \$1.18 2-4 to 7-8. A standing factor in the market after price dipped more than a cent was reports European wheat growing areas suffered unfavorable weather with Germany, France, Italy, Belgium and Holland affected with too much rain.

World wheat shipments for the week totalled 12,614,000 against 10,541,000 last week and 9,350,000 the same week of 1936. Coarse grain trading was quiet with wheat futures posting minor gains and other commodities firm. CHICAGO, May 17—(AP)—Wheat closed advances of more than 1-2 cents a bushel late today owing somewhat to a decrease of 2,280,000 bushels in the United States visible supply.

The decrease reduced domestic stocks in sight to 18,337,000 bushels. This compares with 31,649,000 bushels a year ago. Wheat closed 3-8 off to 1 1/2 up. May \$1.27 1-4 to 3-8 July \$1.18 to \$1.18 1-2 cent unchanged to an advance of 2 1-8 cents. May \$1.32 1-2 July \$1.19 1-8 to 1-4. and oats unchanged to 3-4 higher.

MONTREAL, May 17—(CP)—Hog prices eased 25 cents in early dealings on Montreal livestock markets today while other divisions held steady and unchanged.

Receipts: Cattle 738; calves 985; sheep and lambs 149; hogs 4,493. Good steers sold from \$7.75 to \$8.50 with mediums up to \$7.50 and common kinds mostly \$5 to \$6.50. Heifers ranged from \$4 to \$7.50. Good cows made \$5.25 to \$6 with mediums around \$4 to \$5.25 and common butchers from \$3.25 to \$4. Canners and cutters went from \$2 to \$3.25 while bulls ranged from \$3.25 to \$5.

Good veal calves made \$6.75 to \$7 with medium good kinds around \$5.25. Fat in good kinds sold in mixed lots at \$5 to \$5.75 with plain to fair kinds from \$4.65 to \$4.75 and common kinds at \$4 to \$4.50.

Good spring lambs averaging 50 pounds or better brought \$6 to \$7.50 each while mediums brought around \$5 each with common lights as low as \$3 each. Sheep ranged from \$3.50 to \$5. Bacon hogs, fed and watered, made \$9 with selects at the usual \$1 premium. Butchers and heavies at \$8.50 and extra heavies at \$8. Lights sold at \$8 to \$8.50 with sows at \$6.25 to \$7.25.
