

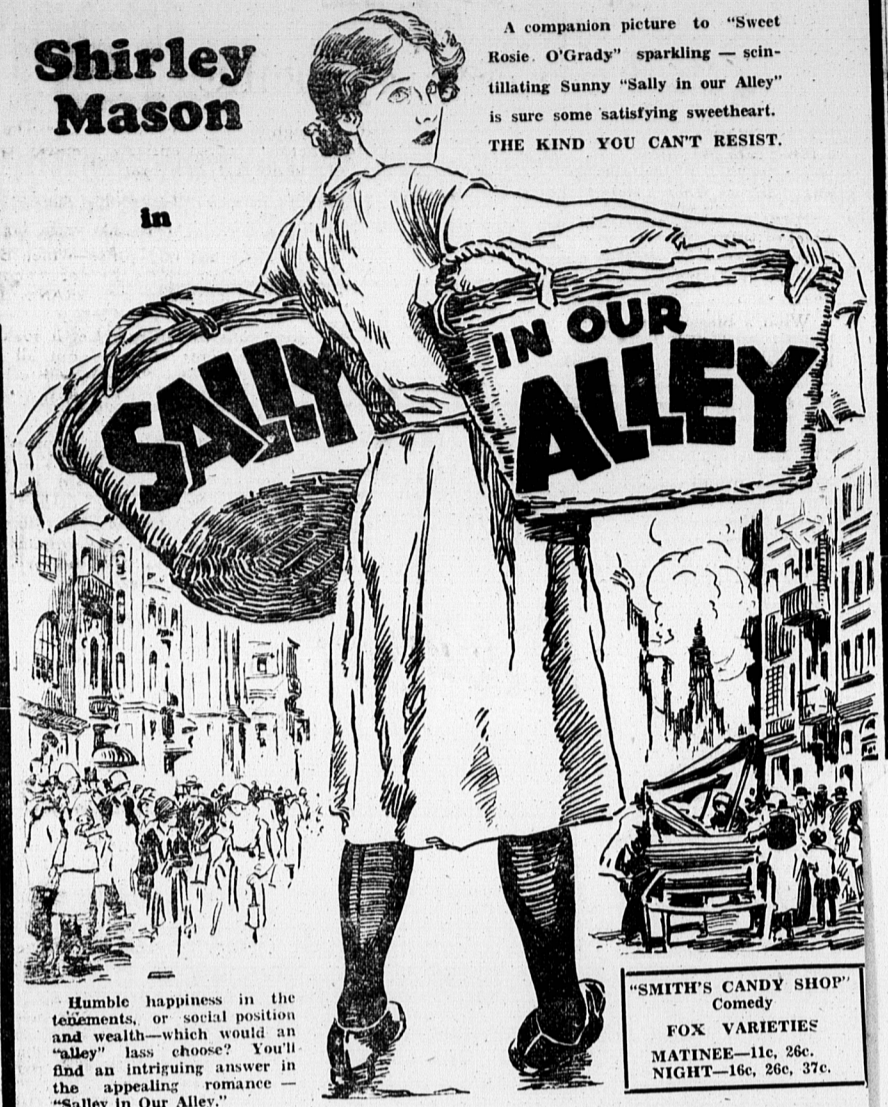

The bout is scheduled to go ten rounds.

Miles Is Off For Hamilton

SYDNEY, Nov. 10.—John Miles, of Sydney Mines, winner of the Halifax Herald Marathon record time, left on this evening's express for Hamilton, Ontario, where he will continue his training for the 1928 Olympics.

Miles, who was visiting in Sydney today, expressed himself highly pleased with his recent victory in Halifax, and declared he found weather conditions excellent. "It was just the kind of day I liked," he stated, "cool, crisp, and I certainly enjoyed running in such weather." Miles stated that when he finished the marathon he was in good condition and felt fresh.
