MARITIME PROVINCES CROPS—After prolonged delay, owing to excessive rain and cold weather, says the Bank of Montreal Crop Report, seeding and planting are nearing completion. Operations in most districts are about two weeks later than in a normal year. Potato plantings have been completed in New Brunswick, but growth has been slow. In Prince Edward Island, owing to wet weather, only about half of the root crop has been planted. Hay and pasture lands are in excellent condition and a good crop of hay is in prospect. The set of early apples is below average, but that of later varieties appears normal. The extent of damage to the whole apple crop from frost cannot as yet be determined. Recent warm, dry weather has been beneficial.

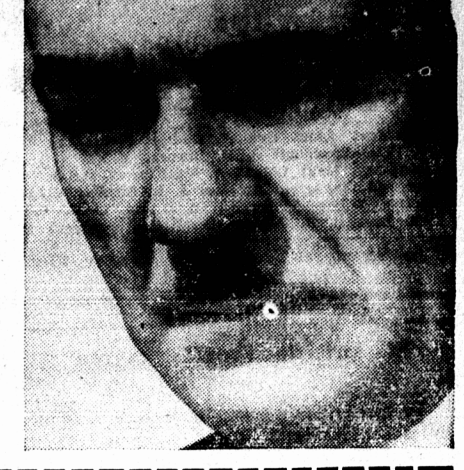

and built a seminary on it. The litigation which has been going on for 20 years was brought before the superior court in Montreal in 1944 and that court ruled that the order need not pay school taxes to the Protestant board. This decision was reversed by the court of King's Bench, appeal's division. And the order appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

The Aylmer Protestant school board authorities argued that the property had originally been assessed for 30 years and on that basis the matter of a religious order owning the property did not apply.

The court ruled that the taxes should be paid but on the basis of 1925 valuation and not on the valuation after the order's seminary was built.

Court Ruling Re-demptorist Property

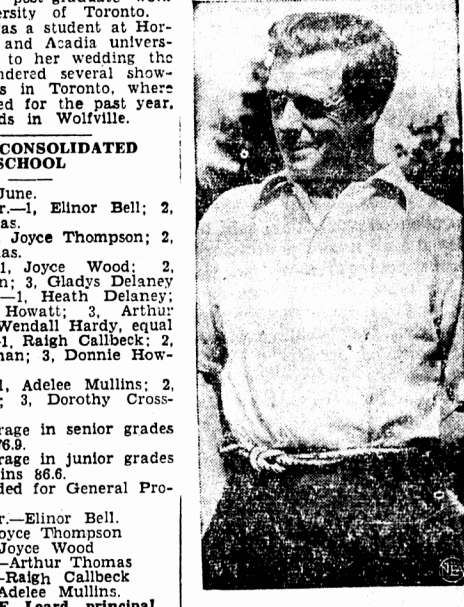
OTTAWA, June 23 — (CP) — The Supreme Court of Canada ruled today that the Redemptorist Order must pay school taxes in support of the Protestant school board of Asper, Que. on property it now owns in the town.
