DEFAULTING TEAM

TORONTO, July 21.—President Quinn, of the Dominion Lacrosse association, makes the following verdict on the Tecumseh-Toronto flacco at Scarboro Saturday.

"I will await an official protest from the Tecumseh club, after which I will take action as follows: 'The Toronto will be suspended and fined five hundred dollars. They will have fifteen days in which to pay their fine and keep their franchise. If they do not decide to pay the league will be finished with the remaining teams. Should Torontos pay their fine they will again be entitled to fill their obligations with other clubs, which includes another game at the island, which they must either play or the same proceedings will be put into effect again.'

POLICE FRUSTRATE BOMB THROWING

LIBSON, July 21.—An organized attempt at bomb throwing in various parts of the city at daybreak yesterday morning was frustrated by the police, who had been warned several automobiles, in which they found packets of bombs, and arrested a large number of persons who had gathered in groups in the streets.

While the police were engaged in these operations, shots were fired and several persons were wounded. One bomb, thrown from an automobile, exploded, killing a policeman and injuring others. A man dressed as a sailor and carrying a bomb, was arrested while attempting to enter the barracks.

Many of those taken into custody are said to belong to the advanced radical party. Some children playing in the street later in the day found two bombs. A boy hit one of the bombs with a hammer and it exploded, wounding him severely.

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, July 23.—Moderate southerly to southwesterly winds, fine and warm.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully clear with bright sun shine all day, continuing clear at night. The temperature at three o'clock this morning by the Rexall Store tested thermometer with a northern exposure was fifty-eight degrees above zero and with a southern was sixty-one above.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was seventy-five degrees above zero and the lowest was fifty-nine above. The lowest the previous night was fifty-seven above. At nine a.m. it was fifty-nine above and at nine p.m. sixty-four above. The tide will be high this afternoon at 1.51 and tomorrow at 2.34; it will be high tomorrow morning at 2.41 and Friday at 3.08.

The sun sets this evening at 7.41 and tomorrow at 7.40; it rises tomorrow morning at 4.33 and Friday at 4.34.

The moon rises tonight at 10.06. The moon was full Friday, July 18 at 2.06 a.m. The last quarter of the moon will be on Saturday, July 26th, at 5.59 a.m. The length of to-day will be fifteen hours and nine minutes.

AUSTRALIA'S NAVY GROWING FAST

LONDON, July 21.—Australia is forging ahead with her preparations for naval defense and to-day the last section of her fleet unit, the dreadnought cruiser Australia, is all ready for sea. She leaves Portsmouth for her new home, Sydney, N. S. W., in charge of Rear Admiral Sir G. Pauley, who is the first admiral of the first Dominion fleet. The light cruiser Sydney, which will accompany her flagship, made a start on Thursday for home waters. This latest addition will bring the Australian navy up to a very respectable strength. The sister ship of the Sydney, H. M. A. S. Melbourne, is already in commission, with three ocean-going destroyers. A third light cruiser, H. M. A. S. Brisbane, and three more large destroyers are now being built at the Cockatoo Island yards, at Sydney Harbor. The light cruiser Encounter, has been lent temporarily to the Australian government by the home navy and the small cruiser Pioneer has been given to Australia, each for the purpose of training and enrolling Australian seamen.

TRAINMEN DECIDE TO STAND PAT.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The first day of conferences between the Federal Mediation Board and the two parties to the controversy involving a threatened strike of eighty thousand trainmen and conductors against the Eastern railroads, closed with the official announcement tonight that there was no change in the situation.

Judge William L. Chambers, chairman of the conciliation body appointed by President Wilson, said the mediators were "more hopeful" however, while both the men and the railway officials informed the board of their purpose to "stand pat" on their platform of grievances, they want arbitration. Under this plan the employers demands would be arbitrated at a later date, and the men given formal notice of thirty days. Both the conductors and the trainmen appear to see in this the only way of averting a strike.

NEW RULES FOR BASEBALL PLAYERS

AUBURN, July 21.—Chairman J. H. Farrell, of the national board of arbitration governing minor baseball to-day gave out the following orders relative to the sale and trading of players among major and minor leagues:— "All optional agreements must be exercised on or before August 15th. "The sale of the release of players within twenty days of the commencement of the major league drafting period or within twenty days of the close of the season of the club disposing of the player, is prohibited. "The sale of a player's release by one national association to another, shall be null and void against the selection by draft of the player by a major league club from the selling

club, unless he be in the actual service of the purchasing club for twenty days before opening of the drafting season for major league.

SWEDISH SUBMARINE SANK LIKE A STONE

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, July 21.—A terrifying accident to a Swedish submarine, which sank with her crew like a stone in 200 feet of water on July 2, has just become known despite official efforts to keep the affair secret. The submarine was practicing outside the harbor when by a mistake all of her tanks were filled simultaneously and she sank to the bottom. The pressure was enormous and the water began to dent the hull. Desperate measures were necessary and Lieut. Beckman in charge of the boat, ordered the lead keel detached. When this was removed the boat rose to the surface and the shaken crew

drawn in great draughts of air. It is stated here that never before has a submarine risen to the surface after sinking to such a depth.

NOTABLE FIGURE PASSES FROM HOUSE OF COMMONS

OTTAWA, Ont., July 21.—When Parliament reassembles the familiar face of old Tom Hewlett, who for the past 35 years has done duty as guardian of the Conservative rooms in the Commons, will be missed by legislators on both sides of the House. His death occurred yesterday at the capital, and another will perform his duties next session. Hewlett saw several Governments come and go, but always remained faithful to the Conservative interests in defeat and success. He knew Sir John A. Macdonald personally, and conversed interestingly on the various outstanding incidents in Canadian political life. By no one was the Conservative triumph of 1911 welcomed more heartily than by Tom Hewlett, and he presided over room 16 with great pride.
