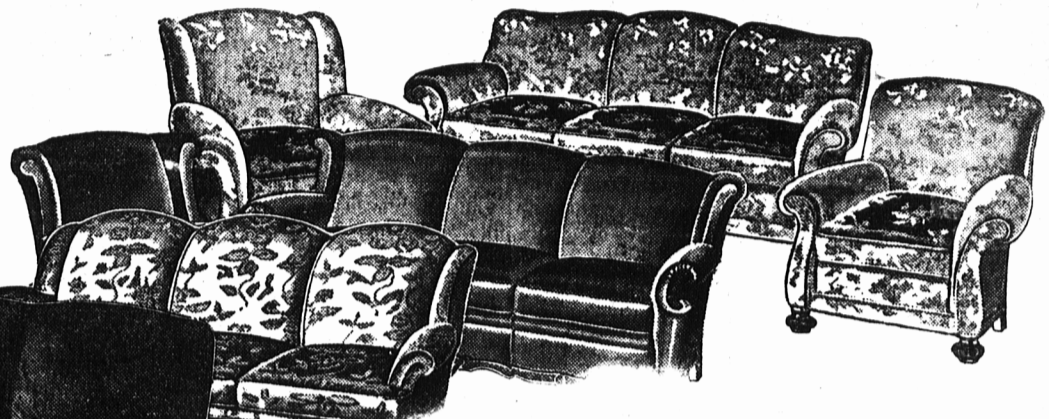
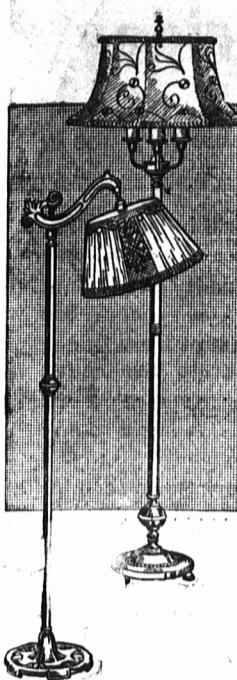

MRS. DONALD MUNRO

Mrs. Donald Munro whose maiden name was Catherine McLean was born at Belle Creek, April 3, 1864, and departed this life at the home of Mr. and Mrs. George McLean Lewis, Caledonia, October 27, 1934. Thus she attained the ripe old age of ninety years and about seven months. God's chastisements are proofs of His love. Of these Mrs. Munro had a rich share during her long earthly pilgrimage. With the loss of her husband over 60 years ago she became a young widow under 30 years of age. Her family, consisting of only two daughters were also taken at the early age of 23. REYNOLDS BABY LAYS CLAIM TO \$25,000,000

WINSTON SALEM, N. C., Nov. 19.—Libby Holman Reynolds' baby son Christopher, yesterday laid claim to the entire \$25,000,000 slice of the Reynolds tobacco fortune which was held in trust for his father, Smith Reynolds. Acting as "next friends" of the infant Christopher, who was born six months after his father's death from a pistol wound on July 6, 1932, R. C. Vaughan filed an inter-plea in the pending litigation over distribution of the trust fund. He asked that Christopher be declared the sole beneficiary and devisee. The inter-plea asked that the court uphold the agreement whereby Mrs. Anne Cannon Reynolds-Smith, first wife of Smith Reynolds, accepted a \$1,000,000 trust fund and waived any further claim upon the Reynolds millions on behalf of herself or her child, Anne Cannon Reynolds, second. Now pending is a motion of the Cabarrus Bank and Trust Company to set aside the \$1,000,000 settlement that Smith Reynolds, made on his first wife and her baby.

Her subject was "Poetry as a Tonic," and her well selected quotations from poets of cheer left no doubt as to the lifting effect of poetry on our drooping spirits. Her delightful reading of old favorites had a certain stimulating effect on the meeting that proved the truth of her contention. There was a big increase in the number of poems submitted anonymously to this meeting and a big improvement in workmanship. WILL FURTHER CHAINS PROBE

Royal Commission Will Resume Investigation Today.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.—Chain stores operations in Canada will be scrutinized further when the Royal Commission on price spreads and mass buying resumes its sitting at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning after the weekend recess. The agenda calls for the submission of evidence of government auditors on Loblaw Groceries Co. Ltd. Special investigators appointed by the Commission have prepared a report on this firm, as in the case of other chain stores. This report covers the financial set-up, gross and net profits and scale of wages of employees of the company. The findings of these officials will be placed before the Commissioners tomorrow morning and afternoon. Members of the Commission will decide tomorrow what matters will be taken up for the rest of the week following the inquiry into the Loblaw concern. The operations of a number of other food and chain stores were gone into last week by the Commission.
