All amounts for Guardian advertising and subscriptions in Montague and vicinity should be paid to W. A. Johnstone agent, and in Souris and vicinity to A. J. McDonald, agent. 1-10drt.

In Montague dealers are paying thirty-eight to forty cents a bus for coats, twenty-two to twenty-five cents a bus for potatoes, fifteen cents a doz for eggs, ten fifty a ten for loose hay, ten and a half cents a lb for pork, twenty to twenty-two cents a lb for butter and eight to nine cents a lb for hides.

The following additional particulars in reference to a thrilling experience on Victoria Day will be found interesting: On Victoria Day six boys belonging to Montague boarded a small sailboat and started down the Montague River. The wind was blowing a gale at the time, a squall struck and she capsized. Owing to quite a quantity of ballast being in the boat her buoyancy was not sufficient to float the entire party. One of the boys seeing this attempted to swim to the shore. The cries of the others attracted the attention of Captain George Allen's son who was on board the schooner "Happy-Go-Lucky" anchored nearby. The lad, though not yet eleven years old, started to the rescue alone in a small vessel boat lying alongside the ship. After proceeding a short way the lad who had started to swim to the shore cried to the boy in the boat to come to him first as he was not able to reach the shore. This he did, directing the swimmer to catch the stern of the boat and in this fashion he towed him ashore. During this time the other five were struggling in the water. One of the number told the writer that when they saw the boy going to the other lad first they were very cold and he said that all he had to support him was that now and then his feet would touch the half-sunken boat; that if they touched her the slightest with their hands she sank below the surface and for the greater part of the time her hull was not visible. At last, when, as he thought, he could hold on no longer, the boy arrived with the frail, small craft. It would not hold them all and was so small that if one of the larger boys had attempted to get into it, she would have sunk. Young Allen, however, was equal to the occasion. As he came up to them he said: "Now, boys, I will not go near to help you unless you promise me that not one of you will catch the sides of the boat, but all go to the stern." This they promised. The two smaller boys were helped in over the stern and the other three clung to the boat and in this way were towed ashore. When they arrived there so cold and numb was one of the party that he was unable to move his limbs. He was carried to the shore and a fire was built to warm him. Great credit is due to Master Allen for his brave deed in rescuing the boys.

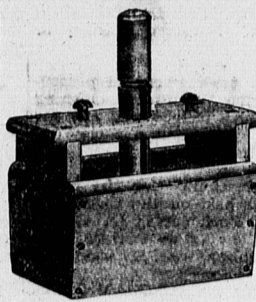

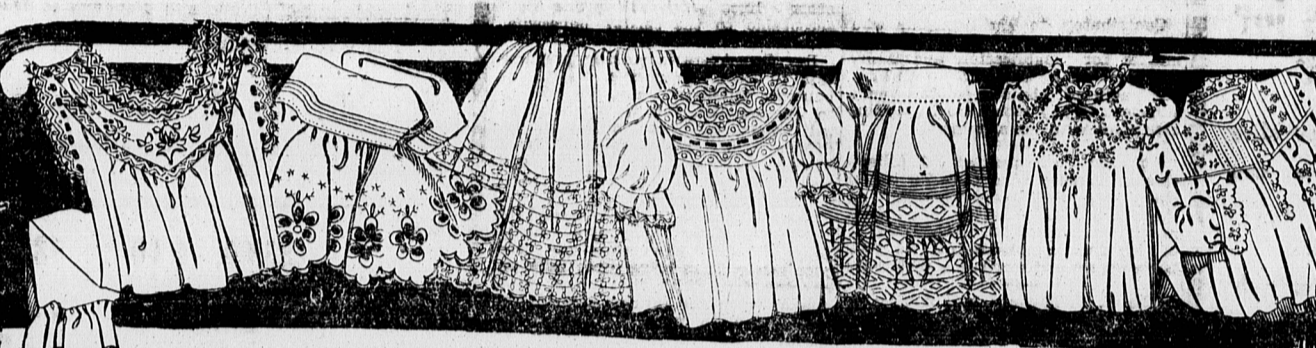
