Invasions In The Future Difficult For Large Army

PARIS, Jan. 29.—It is not the absence of such a tunnel which will protect Great Britain from invasion in the future, said General Taufflieb, a noted French army officer, recently when asked what he thought of the opposition in England to the building of a tunnel under the English channel.

"It would be surprising," he continued, "after a war in which British resource solved such infinitely more difficult problems, if the closing of the passage against an invader could not be made certain in the most absolute sense of the word."

General Taufflieb reviewed the well-known suggestion as heard in the United Kingdom. The narrow passage might be blown up, or might be filled with gas, and the month might be extended from a distance of probably 200 yards by guns, which would blow into nothing anything emerging. "It would require," said the general, "120 trains to take, through a single army camp and that this, without question of ration and ammunition, would take a long time of time."

The general believed, however, that long before the next war, if it came at all, the tunnel as a factor in the military situation will be recognized to have become wholly negligible.

He believed that 200 aeroplanes carrying powerful explosives might be able to deal as deadly a blow to England as invasion itself. "But in any case," he added, "if the task of invasion from one or the other side of the channel, it must be noticed that the mobilization of an army for such a purpose will no longer be as easy as, say, in Napoleon's time, for guns of the Grande Berthe type that bombard Paris from Coucy to an artillery of the future undreamed of until recently. Such an army would find itself under fire before it was formed."

Lord Curzon to Meet French Ambassador In few Parleys

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Lord Curzon, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has arranged to meet Comte De St. Aulane, the French Ambassador tonight, for the first of a series of conversations—the purpose of which is the formulation of an Anglo-French agreement, which was under consideration when the Supreme Council meeting at Cannes broke up.

Amendments and extensions of the agreement recently suggested by Premier Poincare, will be the chief subject of the conversation, but in official circles it is understood the French Ambassador's instructions are to suggest general changes in the proposed pact rather than details. The conversation today was characterized in official quarters as a "voyage of discovery" in Anglo-French relations.

ST. JOHN'S, N.F.L.D., Jan. 28.—All movements of trains and the street cars has been stopped by a blizzard which has raged in New-

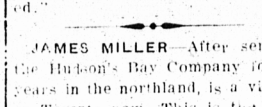
foundland for the last 24 hours, piling up huge drifts. The intense cold has resulted in the closing of many harbours.
