GREAT SUCCESS

CHATHAM, N. B., Sept. 24.—The first day's races at the Chatham Driving Park, in connection with the M. A. A. Exhibition, were witnessed by a crowd of 1,600 patrons who overflowed the grand stands and stood up in autos and carriages along the whole length of the home-stretch.

The events on the card were the 2.23 trot and pace and a named race, each going in straight heats, the first to Henry R, the fast Montreal entry owned by A. Sevigny. The best time in this race was 2.18, and was caused by Mayflower pushing the winner to a hard driving finish in each of the three heats.

The named race was taken by James K. Newbro, driven by Tommy Raymond, who upset all calculations by outfooting The Liar, the fast dark entry from Quebec. The best time was 2.14. The track was in splendid condition and the visiting drivers were loud in their praise of it. Perfect summer weather made the day delightful and the fact that all the horses were out to win and each heat was stubbornly contested furnished plenty of excitement for the big crowd. The fight between Frankie Bogash and The Liar for second place in the named race was a nip and tuck struggle all through and the last heat looked like a dead finish between the two, but the judges awarded the position to The Liar's card consists of the free-for-all and the 2.19 classes and these are expected to be even better than today's program.
