THE PATRIARCH OF LISBON EXPELLED.

LISBON, Jan. 7.—Ensuing on the punishment of the Patriarch of Lisbon, Mgr. Anthony Mendes Ballo, who was ordered to be expelled on December 28, by the Portuguese Government, for two years, all the Portuguese bishops today proclaimed their independence from the government. The Minister of Justice in reply to a communication from them notifying him of their decision, declared that if they persist in their refusal to recognize the civil authorities, they will all be expelled from Portugal, at the same time he will hold them responsible for any disturbances.

The expulsion of the Patriarch of Lisbon caused disturbances in the capital today. Over 10,000 people proceeded to the Patriarchate in order to offer their condolence to the departing prelate. The extreme republicans in the meantime organized a band of 4,000 manifestants who marched to the patriarchate and rushed upon the Catholics assembled there shouting "down with the anarchists" death to the clergy.

The Catholics responded with cheers for the Pope, for Don Manuel and for Don Miguel as well as for the monarchy.

The republics succeeded in breaking through the lines of police and soldiers surrounding the patriarchate, which they invaded, forcing the clergy to flee for safety.

Reinforcements of troops arrived on the scene and drove off the republicans. Many people were injured and there were a number of arrests.

THIRTY-FIVE BELOW AT DULUTH.

DULUTH, Minn., January 5.—Street thermometers here this morning showed 33 to 35 below zero. A slow north wind is blowing. This is the coldest day of the winter.

Yesterday, during the morning and evening hours and through the night, there was experienced what was the stormiest day of the season. The storm sprang up about three a. m. and continued until the afternoon when it subsided for a few hours, only to spring up again about sunset and grow worse than ever. Through it all the temperature registered between 20 and 40 degrees above although the mercury fell after 9 p. m. it did not grow very cold up to the time of going to press. Snow fell in the morning, rain in the afternoon and snow again at night. The wind attained a velocity of 45 miles an hour and from it the greatest damage resulted. The Anglo-American telegraph wire between Charlottetown and Bonshaw was, about 7 p. m., rendered useless as well as several breaks in the Railway line between Charlottetown and Summerside and also on the eastern line. The Anglo-American will effect repairs today if possible and the Railway people will have their wires again in today in all probability. At Souris the force of the storm was severely felt, according to word received from 'The Guardian' correspondent last night. The Arena Summerside skate had to be called off for the present and the agreeable attitude of the weather man kept citizens from moving around very much.
