LONDON, Ont., April 10.—Two condemned men stepped onto the same platform in the yard at Middlesex jail this morning and were hurled to their doom in a hanging carried out by Arthur Ellis, unofficial hangman of Canada. They were Sidney Murrell, 26, bank robber who killed a garage man of the village of Melbourne when the latter attempted to intercept the robber, and Clarence Topping, 23, who shot and killed his sweetheart, Geraldine Durston in a local boarding house last November.

"My time has come, good luck and God bless you all," were the last words of Murrell as he stepped out on the scaffold.

Topping said nothing but went to his doom wearing a bright smile. Both were dead seven minutes after the trap was sprung.

third occasion upon which Sir Henry has spoken to employees of the organization by radio from stations in Eastern Canada, since the National System inaugurated its radio broadcasting service just prior to the close of last year.

After expressing his appreciation of the loyalty which had been shown the administration during the past year by its officers and men, and announcing that this year's objective is thirty million dollars net, Sir Henry delivered the statement quoted above. He then continued: "I have also this to say, we are going to play the game straight. We are going to play the game as sportsmen. We are not going to come in hand in hand to the people of Canada and ask them to give us their traffic because by doing so they will reduce their taxes or by doing so they will be patronizing their own railways. We do not ask for traffic for such a reason, but because the merit of our service entitles us to that patronage. It seems to me that our problem is chiefly the problem of increasing our gross revenue.

There has been a steady reduction in transportation expenses, that is to say, expenses which are chargeable to moving the traffic. In the first two months of 1924, we have reduced our operating expenses by roughly \$2,000,000 as against 1923, and you all know that a dollar saved in transportation expenses is a dollar earned. Our traffic dept. had done exceedingly well, and if we had a sufficient amount of business on this railway, a business which was something equivalent to its mileage, we would have no railway problem, the thing would be solved on the Canadian National railways. Everyone on the system has got to pull for the traffic department and try to add, in some way, each day, each week, each month to our gross receipts."

In concluding his message, Sir Henry referred to the feeling of good fellowship which has grown up between all departments of the system and he again expressed his heartfelt gratitude for the splendid efforts which had been made last year and were being made at the present time by all employees in the service to make the Canadian National Railways a success.

At the conclusion of his speech Sir Henry repeated it in French for the benefit of the French speaking members of the organization.

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Legislative Summary

"Therefore resolved that this Legislative Assembly lay these facts before the Federal Government and Parliament of Canada now in session and urgently pray that they will be pleased to give the farmers of Canada encouragement by absolutely essential measures of protection to their interests, thus: (1) By increasing the rate of duty on the products of the farms of Canada as shall enable the holding of the markets on which we almost wholly depend. We would therefore particularly emphasize the urgent necessity, so far as this Province is affected, of having higher duties on pork, eggs and poultry, if we are to maintain even conditions of equal living and letting alone excepting conditions in any way approaching prosperity. (2) And by bringing about such reductions in transportation rates as will give the farmers of this Province, at least something like equal opportunity in placing their output in the towns and cities of the other Maritime Provinces.

He supported the resolution by a short speech and was followed by Mr. Hunter, Mr. McArthur, Mr. Kennedy, Mr. Buntin and Mr. Dennis.

Mr. Dennis moved, seconded by Mr. Blanchard, that "all words of the resolution after the words Ontario and Quebec in the 7th paragraph be struck out and the following substituted:—Therefore resolved that the Legislative Assembly realizing the hardships and inconvenience brought about by the tariff at present existing between Canada and the United States do respectfully and earnestly ask the Federal Government if possible to negotiate a treaty with the United States, whereby we shall have reciprocal trade with our Southern neighbors, such as was embodied in the Reciprocity pact of 1911. The amendment was at once rejected and the resolution adopted without division. On motion of Mr. Buntin the bill to amend the Act incorporating St. Catherine's Rural Telephone Company was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Tanton the bill to validate certain marriages of the Nazarene was read a second time and committed to Mr. McDonald in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment. It was then, forthwith, read a third time.

Consideration of Clause 3 of the Church Union Bill was then resumed, Mr. Buntin in the chair. Mr. Saunders, Hon. Mr. Stewart, Mr. McArthur, Hon. Dr. McMillan, who said that he had been wrongly reported yesterday and that he wished it to be understood that he was in favor of holding the bill over until next year—Mr. Dennis, Mr. McLean, and Mr. McEwen took part in the discussion which was proceeding when the committee took recess at one o'clock.

In afternoon consideration of the Church Union Bill was continued, Mr. McEwen asked if it were true that there was, in the other provinces, a paid promoter of this Bill. He was in favor of a fair co-operative union. But in this case the property and the name were both taken away. Mr. McEwen said that he knew of no "paid promoter," and argued that by the Bill the Methodist and Presbyterian churches are on exactly the same basis. A union was advisable, and therefore the Bill should pass. Mr. McEwen, Hon. Mr. Myers, Mr. McArthur, Hon. Mr. Kennedy and Hon. W. Prowse took part in a discussion on the amendment, moved by Mr. Buntin, that clause three of the Bill be struck out. On division the amendment was lost, 11 to 10 as follows: Ayes—Hon. Mr. Stewart, Hon. Wm. McNeill, Hon. Mr. Arsenault, Hon. Dr. McMillan, Hon. Mr. Kennedy, Messrs. McEwen, McNevin, McLure, J. A. McDonald, Tanton; nays—Hon. Mr. Myers, Hon. Mr. Wood, Hon. Mr. Prowse, Messrs. McNutt, Howard McDonald, Maynard McDonald, Bentley, McLean, Millan, Hunter, Bentley, McLean, F. B. McDonald, Saunders, McArthur, Irving, Dennis, Blanchard.

Mr. McNEVIN then moved that section three of the Bill be amended by adding to the words "subject to the provisions of section five hereof all property, real and personal, within this Province, belonging to or held by or in trust

for or to the use of any congregation of any of the negotiating churches," provided the same congregation or congregations by a majority vote decided to unite with the United Church. This amendment was lost on the same division, and the original clause passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McNeill the Bill to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act was read a second time and committed, Mr. Hunter in the chair. Hon. Mr. McNeill explained that the Bill was to enable the Town Council to take advantage of the Federal Government grant for Public Highways. This was reported agreed to without amendment.

Consideration of the Bill to assess taxes on income and personal property was then on motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart, resumed in committee. Mr. McNeill explained that the Bill was to enable the Town Council to take advantage of the Federal Government grant for Public Highways. This was reported agreed to without amendment.

On motion of Mr. McEwen the Bill to amend the Statute Laws was read a second time, and committed, Mr. Maynard McDonald in the chair. This Bill provides that on and after the first day of May, 1924, the rule of passing on the streets and highways of the Province shall be to the right when meeting and to the left when passing from the rear; and immediately on the provision of this amendment taking effect, all laws, rules and regulations now in force inconsistent herewith or repugnant to any of the provisions of this Act so taking effect shall be respectively repealed. Mr. J. A. McDonald protested that sufficient time was not given the farmers to become acquainted with this change. He moved that the time to carry the change into effect be extended to the first of December. The committee divided on the amendment, 8 to 18, and the amendment was lost. The Bill then passed in committee without amendment.

On motion of Mr. McEwen the Bill respecting the side of securities was discharged. On motion of Mr. Dennis the Bill to incorporate Mount Pleasant church of the Nazarenes was discharged.

On motion of Hon. Dr. McMillan the House in committee, Mr. Bentley in the chair, resumed consideration of the Bill to provide for the payment of pensions to teachers. The bill was reported agreed to.

On motion of Mr. J. B. McDonald the Bill to incorporate Peake's Piquisid Telephone Company was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the "Appropriation Act, 1923-24" was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Stewart the Bill to amend the Public Servants and Members of the Legislative Assembly Act was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Saunders the Bill to amend the Church of England Incorporation Act was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Tanton the Bill to provide for the organization of Fishermen's Unions was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Bentley the Bill to amend the Kensington Incorporation Act was read a second time and committed, Mr. Maynard McDonald in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

Consideration of the Church Union Bill, in committee, was then resumed, Mr. Buntin in the chair. Mr. Tanton objected to clauses 26 and 27, and moved that they be struck out. The motion carried, and these clauses were struck out. Clause 26 reads: "So far as the Legislature of this Province has power to enact, the basis of Union is hereby ratified and confirmed, and insofar as the terms and provisions thereof are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act they shall have the same force and effect as if expressly set out here-in." Clause 27 reads: "The provisions of this Act of Incorporation shall have full force and effect

with respect to any property or civil rights within this Province." Mr. McNeill moved that the following be added as a subsection to clause 6: "Provided always that no congregation in connection or communion with any of the negotiating churches, shall be deemed to form part of said United Church until, at a meeting of the congregation, regularly called, a majority of votes of the persons present at such meeting and entitled to vote thereat, concur in the said union of the said churches; and when and as soon as any congregation decides in the manner aforesaid, at any time, to enter the union and become part of the United Church, then this Act shall apply to the congregation, and all the property thereof, from the date of such decision.

The Speaker declared this amendment out of order.

Mr. McNeill then moved that clause 7 be reconsidered. This motion was lost on the following division: Ayes—Hon. Mr. McNeill, Hon. Mr. Kennedy, Hon. Mr. Arsenault, Hon. Dr. McMillan, Messrs. McEwen, McNevin, McLure, J. Augustine McDonald, Tanton; nays—Hon. Mr. Myers, Hon. Mr. Prowse, Messrs. McLean, McNutt, Howard McDonald, Maynard McDonald, Hunter, Bentley, J. B. McDonald, Saunders, McArthur, Irving, Dennis, Blanchard, Shaw McMillan.—15.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McDonald the Bill imposing a tax on gasoline was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Tanton moved that the Bill to incorporate the Elmstale Church of the Nazarene be read a third time. Mr. McNeill moved in amendment that the Bill be read a third time six months hence. The amendment was agreed to on division. The House then adjourned until ten o'clock tomorrow.

"Italy Now on Firm Basis" (Continued From Page One)

Slava would never consent to an Italian success at their expense. Mussolini satisfied the Jugo-Slavs by private agreement, after all the allies and the late Woodrow Wilson had failed to solve the Flame problem.

These successes in foreign affairs have made it possible for Mussolini to progress with his internal reform program, indifferent to hostile domestic criticism. The Greek and Flame victories were due solely to Mussolini's good judgment; and such evidences of efficiency have encouraged the Italians to trust Mussolini's viewpoint in his rigid domestic and disciplinary methods.

There is only one direction in which Mussolini has failed to win his way. He has not solved the problem of Italian emigration. He has abandoned hope of being able to send increasing numbers of Italians to the United States. Nevertheless, he has strongly protested against the American Congress further curtailing the Italian quota, and to the present has succeeded in this direction just as he worked his way with Greece and Jugo-Slavia.

One Big Problem.

One even under the present American quota law Mussolini still has an increasing number of Italians at home with no place to go. He desires to send them to Africa and the Near East; but the Italians have not got a high degree of pioneering enterprise. The road must be smoothed before they will venture forth. Mussolini, however, realizes that if Italy's future is to be glorious as he dreams the Italians must develop a new colonizing impetus. So he is trying to encourage his fellow countrymen to cross the Mediterranean and apply themselves to developing pioneer abilities in Africa and Asia Minor.

A movement in Italy to approach the Japanese for a joint policy on

emigration has not secured Mussolini's indorsement; nor, indeed, have the Japanese shown any desire to associate themselves with this bizarre idea. The fundamental basis of the scheme is to compel America to open her ports to the world at large. Mussolini is too shrewd to avow his sympathy for such a proposal. But other Italians are discussing it, and Mussolini will have to produce a counter-proposal if his Mediterranean colonization plan fails to send the Italians overseas.
