FREIGHT REDUCTION—Mr. Wallace L. Higgins, secretary of the Charlottetown Board of Trade has received word that the rate of freight on fruit and vegetables in car loads from Boston to Charlottetown has been reduced to 88 1/2¢ per 100 lbs., effective June 15th next which will place this province in the same position as competing points on the mainland. This is quite a concession to importers, the original rate being \$1.15 per 100 lbs. A reduction of 25¢ was also arranged through the efforts of Mr. Higgins some time ago which rate will now be in effect until the new rate goes into force. This makes a total reduction of 40 p. c.

TODD-BRUCE WEDDING—A quiet and very pretty wedding took place on Monday, May 9th at the home of the bride's father, Mr. A. E. Bruce, Valleyfield, where his daughter, Catherine Isabel, became the wife of Mr. Samuel K. Todd, the well-known and highly esteemed accountant with the Canadian Packing Co. Rev. J. D. McLellan, Presbyterian minister officiated. The happy couple were the recipients of many valuable and useful presents, including several handsome checks. The bride, who has been taking a course at the Charlottetown Business College has a large circle of friends and was very popular. The happy couple will make their home at 5 Grafton Street where the best wishes of a host of friends.

FURTHER PARTICULARS—In the recent examinations of Dalhousie University, it was pleasing to note, that as usual the Island students acquitted themselves very creditably—in several cases their names standing at the very top of the list. Sister Rose Celestine (Josephine Gaudet) Miscouche, led her classes in French II and Latin III, obtaining a high first in both; Miss Georgie L. McLean, Lot 16, led her class in English II receiving a high first, as well as leading her class in Philosophy and winning Honorable mention by the University Senate, while Miss A. Pearl Moase led her class in Greek III and came 2nd; being beaten in Latin only by another Islander. When it is considered that there are seven hundred attending Dalhousie University the marks made by these brilliant students certainly reflect credit on the Prince of Wales College where they received their foundation work.

WORK ON HIGHWAYS—Work under the Highways Act has been started in this Province between Montague and Cardigan on the St. Peters Road near Charlottetown on the Summerside-Borden project near Summerside, and on the Fish town-French River project. Messrs E. W. Stewart and E. P. Munn have the contract for the first named project and Mr. J. C. Crabbe for the second. Robert Walker for the third and Mr. Duane McKenzie for the 4th. Valerius MacDonald, J. C. Milford, W. A. McLavren and Mr. Anderson are the respective engineers. All these projects call for the same class of work, namely, ditching, grading, road-machining and concrete culverts. Messrs Phillips, Maynard and Noy expect to start this week. The other contractors expect to be at work next week. A carload of road-making machinery arrived yesterday. From reports received much more ordinary road work has been done up-to-date than in previous years. The people are taking increased interest in road-making and there is no difficulty in getting the requisite labor of men and horses. Judging from present indications there will be great activity in road making all through the province this year.
