## Grove chalks Up 299th Pitching win

PHILADELPHIA, July 3—(AP)—Robert Moses Grove won his 299th game today as he pitched Boston Red Sox to a 5-2 American League victory over the Athletics. One more triumph will make Grove the 12th pitcher in major league history to hit the 300 mark.

Jim Tabor's three-run double in the first inning gave Grove a good lead and Ted Williams' two-run homer in the eighth sewed up the game.

Aside from the second inning when he cut loose with a wild pitch, Old Mose showed perfect control when the A's had men on base, and he gave no walks.

A crowd of 8,000 gave the veteran 16 seasons in the big leagues a cheer when he left the mound. It was the sixth victory against two defeats this season for Grove who spent nine years with the Athletics and the last seven with the Red Sox.

## Will call on Older Players If necessary

MONTREAL, July 3—(CP)—The National Hockey League will endeavor to replace players in military service by older men next season, President Frank Calder said today.

He added that if the league found it necessary to reduce the number of players on each team "we will do so."

"The NHL, even if it could, would do nothing at all to deter any player from entering military service," he said. "On the contrary, the league is proud of all its young men who have entered such service."

## Will dedicate Monument to Gehrig today

NEW YORK, July 3—(AP)—The biggest crowd in the major leagues tomorrow is expected to jam Yankee Stadium to join in a tribute to Lou Gehrig before the Yankees' doubleheader with Washington Senators.

Club officials said they expect more than 65,000 fans to be present for the dedication of a monument in centrefield to the memory of the great first baseman who played in 2,130 consecutive games over a 14-year span with the Yankees.

Gehrig died last month at the age of 37 of an incurable disease that hardened the spinal cord and caused muscles to shrivel.

## High jump Bewildering to Track fans

NEW YORK, July 3—(AP)—Since the boys started clearing six feet six inches without taking a deep breath, the high jump has been, to many fans, the most bewildering event in track and field.

It's reasonably understandable that a man can go over 15 feet in the pole vault, since he has the assistance of a pole. But it's hard to understand how anyone can expect to jump almost a foot higher than the top of his head.

NEW YORK, July 3—(AP)—St. Louis Cardinals cracked defensively today and Chicago Cubs scored two unearned runs behind Claude Passeau's five-hit pitching to win 2-1.

The defeat at Chicago dropped the Cardinals into a tie with the idle Brooklyn Dodgers for first place in the National League.

The Cubs scored in the fourth inning when Johnny Hoop dropped Clyde McCullough's fly ball in left field. Bill Nicholson sent the burly catcher to third and he scored on an infield out. The other run scored when second baseman Frank Crespi failed to handle Lou Stringer's ground ball in the seventh.
