"THE FUTURE OF CANADA"

SPEECH BY MR. L. GEORGE DEWAR

Canada, who's Dominion extends from ocean to ocean, and from the international boundary line to the Polar Seas, is vast in extent, and splendidly endowed with all those resources that contribute to national greatness.

The four great sources of wealth, fertile lands, rare minerals, immense forests, and valuable fisheries, nature has bestowed with a lavish hand, and justly distributed all over the country.

In Eastern Canada the waters of the Atlantic are teeming with fish, and her parts are always open to commerce. Nova Scotia has valuable coal mines, good farms, and the far-famed Annapolis fruit valley. New Brunswick has its land, mineral and timber resources. While in the beautiful Garden of the Gulf, the finest butter, eggs, potatoes, and domestic black and silver foxes in all Canada, are to be found.

Quebec and Ontario have great agricultural, forest and mineral wealth, the nickel mines of Sudbury, and the asbestos mines of Quebec, control the world market for those products.

The rich soil of the Prairie belt produces hundreds of millions of bushels of wheat for export, the finest wheat and oats in the world can be grown nine hundred miles north of the international boundary line.

West of the great plain is the land of mountain and flood of scenic beauty, with its reputation for salmon and halibut, and such minerals as gold and copper, as well as fruit, and flowers, and wonderful trees, and a climate mild and tempered by the balmy breezes of the Pacific.

Canada has the greatest inland water transportation system in the world, the noble St. Lawrence, with the great chain lakes extending 2,000 miles into the heart of the country, bars an immense freight and passenger traffic upon its bosom, while its waterfalls, including the mighty Niagara, contain great possibilities for the development of electric energy, which is sure to play its part in the coming industrial revolution, which is destined to make Canada a great manufacturing nation, and which will build up a great chain of cities extending from Sidney to Vancouver, which will supply a home market for the products of agriculture—our greatest and basic industry.

Canada has over 40,000 miles of railway, the greatest in the world for the population, and we have mortgaged the future for the benefits of transportation by rail, but the great population that Canada will yet carry will reduce the debt burden to the minimum. Our railways will all be needed with the extension of external and internal trade, which is increasing by leaps and bounds.

Canada is unrivalled geographically for foreign trade, equipped by modern science for the conquest of land, and sea, and air and situated between the two great oceans, she is in a position to command the trade of the Orient, and her sister Dominions of the southern hemisphere, and that greatest of all world markets—the Mother Country, and other European nations, also West Indian and South American markets, and that nearest of all foreign markets, the United States, with its great and ever-expanding population, which will tend to make it a consuming nation as the years roll by.

Co-operative marketing and the finest quality of products will tend to build up an immense trade. Canada has been truly described as the land of opportunity to whom the twentieth century be-

longs, during the last twenty-five years, Canada's progress has eclipsed that of other nations, this progress can best be estimated by a comparison with that of other nations, and more especially the great republic to the south: Wheat production has increased more than seven times, live stock three fold, and dairy production more than four times, manufacturing production has grown six fold, and that of minerals from \$65,000,000 to \$240,000,000.

Foreign trade has increased rapidly until it now amounts to over \$2,000,000,000, it was not until United States had a population of 75,000,000, that her export trade equaled that of Canada in 1926, and on any other bases of comparison we find that Canada has outstripped anything ever known in the history of that great country.

But with all our diversified and unrivaled resources, our greatest asset has been found in the character of our men and women, a virile

faith of our educational leaders who have, amid many difficulties mounded a system of universities, colleges, and schools that redound to their lasting credit, and the students who have been educated in these institutions are to be found in the front ranks of human endeavour.

In literature, science, and art, we have made steady advancement, in the realm of romance and poetry, there has been quite a display of talent and genius, and although we have produced no outstanding figure, there are great possibilities as we advance from youth to manhood, it took over a thousand years of English history to produce a poet like Shakespeare, and a scientist like Francis Bacon.

The future political destiny of Canada has been the theme of much discussion, both in the old country and in the new, what effect this will have on the minds of men, and the logic of events, time alone can reveal. "There is a divinity that shapes our ends rough hew

them as we will." We live side by side with a great nation, speaking the same language, having the same ideals, and while there will always be friendly relations, both economic and social, there should never be annexation, and it is in the interests of both countries that they remain separate.

Canada can best realize her destiny as a great and powerful member of the British Commonwealth of free Nations, which will give all the freedom and independence, that is needed to satisfy her national aspirations, with the protection and prestige that a family union will give, and which will tend to the reign of peace and good-will among the nations. And it would be well to remember that it is righteousness, and not wealth that exalteth a nation, greed and selfishness tend to inefficiency, waste, and decay, while the fruit of the spirit will tend to National strength.

The lines of Byron to the people of Greece are fitting: Alas, no foreign foe could quell Thy soul, till from itself it fell: Yes, self abasement paved the way To villain bonds, and despot sway. And the same could be applied to the Romans, and to the ancient Hebrews, as they sat by the rivers of Babylon and wept when they remembered Zion. The people of Canada warned by the mistakes of the nations of the past, and inspired by lofty ideals, shall rise above the reeking atmosphere of the political cesspool, and have a vision of the sun-kissed heights, with their brighter, and purer atmosphere, where truth and justice are enthroned.
