IN MEMORIAM

MR. DAVID FRASER

News of the sudden passing away of Mr. David Fraser of Vernon, B.C., a great shock to the community. 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Proceedings In Legislature

The Legislature met yesterday at 11 a.m. Mr. Strong asked if the Premier had any information regarding the refrigerator car shortage. One dealer had eleven cars in ship to Long Island and could not, secure, any cars. Premier Jones said he was in contact with an agent of the Government at Montreal, who was working on a suggestion to have express taken by transport planes to and from the Province. The two express cars now running from Charlottetown and Summerside take up the space of three refrigerator cars on the ferry. This would mean 18 more refrigerator cars a week which would accommodate 14,000 bushels of potatoes. The outgoing express would have to be handled in the same way. He had authorized the agent to discuss this plan with Premier Jones.

—Premier Jones' "Perhaps the Premier could give us some information as to whether the Sanatorium has been let." Premier Jones: "The contract has been awarded to M. F. Schurman and Company, Summerside; the lowest tender."

—Dr. McMillan called attention to a serious situation with regard to failure of parents to send their children regularly to school. He quoted a letter he had received in which the father of a child was blamed for employing child-labor when they should be in school. Compulsory education is the law of the province and it is the responsibility of the districts to see that this law is enforced. Dr. McMillan said "Teachers frequently complain that 50 per cent of their classes because the school attendance was not up to the required standard."

—Mr. H. Strong said the responsibility lay with the inspectors. Yet it is doubtful if there was ever a suggestion laid by an inspector under the Act. Mr. Saville thought the responsibility lay mainly with parents and inspectors, and perhaps the teachers were partly responsible. He wondered if a trustee officer could not be appointed for each County. As long as the trustee officer is under the school trustees they won't move.

—After further discussion, the bill was reported agreed to. Meeting after recess, the House gave third reading to the Apprenticeship Act.

—The House resumed the debate on the motion to go into Supply. The speakers being Mr. H.H. Cox, Hon. Mr. McGugan and Mr. Douglas McKinnon. Mr. W.H. Dennis moved the adjournment at the conclusion of Mr. McKinnon's speech at 6 o'clock.

—The House adjourned until 11 a.m. today.

Bigamy Case In N. B. Court

MONCTON, March 15 (CP)—In the Moncton Police Court this morning Mrs. Rowella Mutch, Belmont Street, was charged with having gone through a marriage ceremony with one John H. Mutch, New Brunswick, and the case was adjourned to March 21.

—The accused is said to have married Mrs. Mutch at Charlottetown, P. E. I. on November 27, 1923. Witnesses will be called from Prince Edward Island and the case is adjourned to permit them the necessary travelling time.
