Bell Government "Sand Bagging"

The Patriot has evidently been falling foul of its party friends in Montserrat in its frantic endeavor to fasten the blame for the hay fever on one of the government supporters who, it alleged, the government was cautioned against. The following amusing letter, under the significant heading of "Explanation," was published in yesterday's Patriot:

EXPLANATION

Sir, In your editorial entitled "The Government Hay" you gave expression to some ideas to which with your kind permission I wish to refer, especially in view of the fact that your identification marks appear to indicate that the writer is one of those to whom you make reference. I have no desire to voluntarily enter the controversy occasioned by "Liberal Electors" contribution to the Guardian but there is one paragraph in your editorial about which I feel somewhat concerned. From this your readers will naturally infer that "Liberal Electors" is pretty well known and the Department was cautioned that if they had any dealings with this individual they might expect both criticism and dissatisfaction. From this your readers will naturally infer that "Liberal Electors" and the consignment to whom the hay was shipped, knew absolutely nothing about "Liberal Electors" until he read it some thirty-six hours after its publication in the Guardian. In matters of this kind, any representations to the Department which seem advisable should be made directly and not by using the newspapers as a medium. In regard to the second part of the paragraph quoted in which you say "the Department was cautioned," etc., the implication is that the individual who took advantage of the Government's offer of a supply of hay, primarily for the purpose of, possibly opening an avenue through which the Government might be criticized for political effect. This idea Mr. Editor is as false as the impudently promulgated certain individuals which promoted certain individuals. The fact of the matter is that the majority of those who clubbed with the consignee to secure a car load of hay are gentlemen who are friendly to and supportive of the present Government—men who appreciate the action of the Department in endeavoring to assist the farmers in their extremity. Does it seem reasonable to assume that one whose name was to engender dissatisfaction and criticism, I am willing to be judged by them. I may say further that I had previously been advised of certain individuals getting in touch with the Department a few days after the order was placed for the purpose of "enlightening" the officials as to whom they were dealing with. This information I could scarcely regard as confidential, as the paragraph quoted from your editorial, I feel free to credit them with conspiring to do an injury to any person or animal. I would much prefer to think that a somewhat crude effort was being made to consolidate their political standing with the party.

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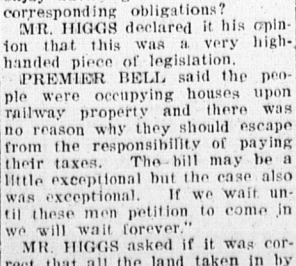
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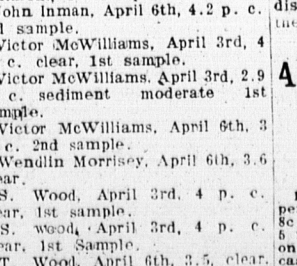
