**More New Deal Set For Trial In U.S. Court**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The United States supreme court, without ceremony or even so much as a gesture of dedication, will assemble in its new palace of justice Oct. 7 for what observers predict will be its most momentous session in history.

Whatever the significance of its decisions, the court's term will be historic, marking occupation of "only real 'home' since its meeting in the Royal Exchange of the foot of Broad Street in New York in February, 1790.

It will be a session of superlatives; the issues most far-reaching in generations, to be settled in the most magnificent setting in Washington. Vital "new deal" measures may be upheld or struck down, in a \$10,000,000 marble structure to be the permanent home of the court—the same body which, in early days, held its session for a time in a little tavern.

Observers declare, as the court prepares to begin its term, that what happens in the vast, white Grecian-like building may have a direct and compelling bearing on the 1936 presidential election, as well as upon the nation's future. Many believe a smashing setback of the Roosevelt program would bring forward a direct campaign battle as to the advisability of amending the constitution. Substantial success before the court might cement "new deal" philosophy into the law of the land so firmly that it long might stand regardless of who is elected president.

Administration legislation regarded as virtually certain to come before the bar of the court, for continued life or sudden death, include several acts standing at the core of the President's program. They involve the agricultural adjustment act, the slum-clearance
