HORSE KILLED IN COLLISION—A car driven by Mr. Alex Pineaue of Charlottetown collided with a horse drawn wagon on the pavement a mile east of Hunter River Saturday morning killing the horse. Mr. Albert Paul of Brookfield, owner and driver of the horse, was injured although shaken up. The accident occurred on a hill, Mount-Ed Police said. Snow banks edged the road on both sides leaving little more than space for a single track.

ENGINE DERAILED—Railway men labored for several hours late Saturday afternoon before heavy switching engine off the track at Fredericton Station was again on the rails. Meanwhile traffic was not disrupted as trains were rerouted over the siding past the engine blocking the main line. There was but slight damage to roadbed and engine. The engine was enroute to Charlottetown from Borden.

POLICE COURT—At the Police Court Saturday a man charged with theft of a radio was remanded until Thursday. A man and a woman convicted of a breach of the Customs act each was fined \$10 and costs or three months in jail. One drunk was fined \$10 and costs or five days in jail and another who failed to appear had his bail bond exonerated.

PLANE LEAVES FOR OVERHAUL—The Canadian Airways plane, which has been used on the regular mail and passenger service between Moncton, N. B., and Charlottetown this season, left Saturday for Toronto for overhauling. The plane brought here for the Madalen Island winter service similar to the first machine. It was placed on the run. Pilot H. S. Jones, with Benjamin Rogers, Jr., of Charlottetown, as a passenger, planned to stop over at Moncton. Saint John and Montreal, remaining at the latter port overnight before proceeding to Toronto.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH Pre-Easter services were conducted in Trinity Church each evening of Holy Week, conducted by the Ministers, Rev. Hugh Miller and Rev. A. E. MacKenzie, Rev. J. M. MacLeod and Rev. Henry Pier. The Preparatory Service was held Friday evening when the Session received 100 new members into full communion, 88 on Profession of Faith and 12 from other churches. The Sacrament of Holy Communion was observed at both services, with an unusual large number present at the morning filling the large auditorium and overflowing into the gallery. The subject of the morning sermon by Rev. Mr. Miller was "Jesus Only," based on the Transfiguration. Budget Debate In Legislature Hon. Mr. McGuigan Reviews Health And Educational Activities.

Following Mr. St. Clair Trainor in the Budget debate on Tuesday evening, Mr. Donald M. MacKay, First District of Queens, P.E.I., have been hearing a great deal about a "balanced budget." That certainly is a Liberal objective. How it is to be brought about is another question. "Those of us who live to see the day," he predicted, "will see that it is achieved by a Liberal Government."

The trouble, he suggested, with the Government without the election is that the Government is not operating with its own constituents were clamoring for improvements of all kinds, and with the same breath they say "balance the Budget."

Under such conditions, the Government must be occupying a position of compromise, Mr. MacKay declared. There is a certain class of people looking for an increase in salary at the present time; a deserving class but one which is already in comfortable circumstances. The needs of our more distressed farmers should, he urged, come first.

Leaks Above and Below Mr. MacKay cited with approval a statement by Mr. Seville, to the effect that there were leaks below and above the water line; that the latter were visible to all and could be stopped by the work below the water line that was dangerous.

HON. M. R. MCGUIGAN Hon. M. R. McGuigan, Minister of Health and Education, complimented the Premier on his "incisive and comprehensive statements" and also the Ministers and other members who had spoken in the budget debate.

The Higgs Commission "So far as those settlements are concerned," he continued, "it was always my humble opinion that the report of the Higgs Commission should have been accepted. Whether it would have worked out any better is a question. It might have worked out to a greater outlay of money, and it might have gone the other way. I don't know."

Upsalquitch Survey Is Authorized FREDERICTON April 16—The corporations committee of the Legislature today reported the Upsalquitch Water and Power Company bill, with major amendments. As amended the bill provides that the company may be incorporated to carry out a survey, but actual development of hydro alone the river may be undertaken only if the government-in-council so authorizes.
