## Crew Of Fishing Vessel Rescued

BOSTON, Mass., May 13.—Sixteen members of the crew of the French fishing vessel Marie Edmee, rescued off the Newfoundland fishing banks will arrive here Monday on the Swedish steamer Etna, bound here from Swansea, Wales. A wireless message from the coastguard cutter Modoc to Washington headquarters last Wednesday referred to the rescue ship as the "Swansea out of Boston," and added that the other seventeen members of the crew had been saved by the French fishing boat Flora. No details of the rescue were given in the message from the Etna today telling of the presence of the men on board.

## Additional Votes For The Island In Estimates

OTTAWA, May 12. — The last sitting day of the present week saw the House of Commons in Committee of Supply, put through a large number of items under the heading of "Harbors and Rivers".

With the exception of but a few items, the appropriations under this heading for the provinces of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, were approved.

Total appropriations for harbors and rivers in Nova Scotia are \$492,100; and in Prince Edward Island, \$229,800.

The sum of \$229,800 for Prince Edward Island included \$140,000 for reconstruction of the Railway wharf at Charlottetown, and \$23,700 for breakwater repairs at Rustico Harbor.

Before the vote was carried J. A. MacDonald, (Conservative, Kings) protested to the Minister against discrimination against his county. He claimed that the harbor works at Souris required attention.

Mr. Elliott mentioned the vote of \$90,000 last year for a potato storage warehouse in Kings County as indicating that the government had not discriminated against the constituency.

Mr. Elliott then moved that the committee rise and report progress.

The morning service is a special one with Bible School work and at the evening service a special talk for young people. The following Sunday when an endeavour will be made to have as many whole families present as possible after which service all are invited to remain for "Church Family" dinner.

At last night's Sing Song in the Y. M. C. A. Rev. Canon Vernon of Toronto was the special speaker, and his topic "Building For The Dominion" was a most interesting and helpful one.
