Rangers Shut Out By Montreal 2-0

Two Goals By Neville, Wheeler Centre In Second Period Gives M. A. A. Big Edge On Series

FORUM, Montreal, Que., March 21.—The white-sweatered Rangers of Dalhousie, New Brunswick, went into action against Montreal Amateur Athletic Association seniors here tonight in the first game of the Maritimes-Quebec round in the Allan Cup playdowns. The return match will be played here Wednesday night. Total goals decide the right to meet either Ottawa Shamrocks or Toronto Nationals in the Eastern Canada final.

The husky bunch of fellows from Dalhousie did not go into battle tonight without support. Former Maritimers turned out en masse and gave the boys from down east plenty of encouragement.

Confident and in good condition after three or four days rest, the Maritimers entry in the annual Allan Cup race looked smart in their early workout before the game was called.

Maritimers rose to their feet with a shout as Pop Kerr rushed in on Coulter from the face-off. He worked in as far as the Montreal defence again but his shot was smothered. The Rangers got off three more rushes to the blue line and then the blue and red Wheelers got in to stride and Delaney and Neville came dangerously close to McCann.

Dud James and Duke Taylor were through on Coulter but St. Germain checked from behind and the shot failed to get away. Neville buzzed a high drive at McCann and missed. The first penalty of the game went to Bill Walker. The big Dalhousie defenceman was chased for tripping Randy Kerr.

Kit Massey went off for hooking and the sides were even again. McKenzie was off too for slashing Butterworth and the Montreal squad had only three men in front of the goalie. They faced the entire Dalhousie team and held them off till their penalized forces were with them again. The Winged Wheelers moved to the attack, but passes went wrong inside the blue line. Neville got another good shot at McCann but the down east goalie was not caught napping.

Both teams sent their second lines on to rest the heavy artillery. The Maritimers had trouble with the Montreal defence and could not get through. Dave Neville came back into action and nearly fooled McCann with a waist high drive from inside the blue line.

Pete Jotkus drew a tripping penalty and the Montreal team was a man shy once more. The Wheelers backedchecked closely and kept the Maritimers at arm's length. St. Germain sauntered down the left boards and got through the Dalhousie defence for a corner shot at the Maritimers' goalie.

The second period had just settled down when Dave Neville broke the scoreless deadlock and put the Winged Wheelers out in front. St. Germain had rushed. Duke Taylor went back to the Montreal blue line and Dave Neville picked up the puck, stickhandled through the Dalhousie defence and slipped the puck through McCann's ankles into the cage. McKenzie and Duke Taylor drew penalties. Then Delaney and Bill Walker started highchecking each other in a corner and went off.

LeBlanc got the best shot at Coulter that the Maritimers had up to that point. He stickhandled inside the defence and flipped a backhandler at the goalie but Coulter trapped it between his pads. Penalties began to take a heavy toll of the Winged Wheelers. The Rangers pressed their advantage and Coulter was a busy man. LeBlanc and Butterworth nearly scored from close inside. In their eagerness the Rangers committed offense after offense.

CHANGE MADE Montague Wins McArthur Trophy From Ch'Town

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., March 20.—To meet the wishes of Western Canada delegates to the annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association here, changes have been made in dates for the Allan Cup and Memorial Cup playdowns, Frank Greenleaf, Vice-President of the Association, announced.

The Eastern final in the Allan Cup playdowns was to be played in Toronto, March 26, if Toronto Nationals defeated Ottawa Shamrocks. This date has been altered to March 25. The return game is to be played in Montreal March 28. Montreal M. A. A. and Dalhousie Rangers meet here March 21 and 23 to decide an opponent to meet the winner of the Ottawa Shamrocks-Toronto Nationals series.

In the Memorial Cup playdowns, Montreal M. A. A. victors over Antigonish, will meet the winner of the Sudbury Wolves-Ottawa Shamrock Juniors round in Toronto or Ottawa on March 23 for the first game and in Montreal on March 25 for the second. The original dates were March 25 and 28. This will enable the eastern finalists to leave for Winnipeg March 26 in time for the finals March 28 and 30.

Western delegates will be able to see the Memorial Cup playdowns in Winnipeg before starting to Montreal for the annual meeting and the Allan Cup finals here April 4, 6 and 8.

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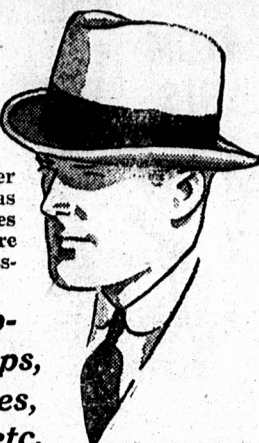
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Winnipegs Are Eliminated By Fort William 1-0

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Mar. 21.—(By the Canadian Press)—Fort William's hard-fighting senior hockey team tonight put the world champion Winnipeggs out of the running for the Allan Cup. The teams battled tonight for 60 minutes to a scoreless tie and the lone goal the "Forts" collected in the first game of the two-game series at Winnipeg Saturday night decided the issue. The Lakehead squad took the round 1 to 0. Fort William now meets Calgary Bronks to decide the Western Canada title and for the right to go east in the Allan Cup final.

A GRACIOUS LOSER Gene Tunney's story of how he beat Jack Dempsey to gain the world's heavyweight championship and of the troubles that the title brought him were told recently. Tunney asserted he won the fight with a single blow, a right to the cheek bone, scored in the first round. He told about his visit to Dempsey on the day after the fight, and said that he "had never known a more gracious loser."

Tunney then told of the unpopularity that was his. "Looking back from this distance" Tunney writes, "I could have been a more gracious winner. I goaded, and gloated. I richly deserved what I got."

Tunney said the "first seed of retirement" came after he had recovered from a training camp injury. A sparring partner and Tunney cracked heads and the champion lost part of his memory for three days, while preparing for the second Dempsey fight.

"On these occasions all seemed queer," Tunney wrote. "I was unable to orient myself. . . . There were three newspapermen at camp reporting my activities. They had to be deceived. This story was too sensational to get out."
