Queenston—Chippewa Power Development

Q. What is the Queenston-Chippewa Power Development?

A. The Queenston-Chippewa Power Plant, on the Niagara River, was constructed by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario. It is the largest hydro-electric power development in the world, utilizing a head of 305 feet, the maximum developable between Lakes Erie and Ontario. Water is conveyed into it by a canal 12½ miles long from Chippewa above the falls to forebay and screen house at the top of the lower Niagara River gorge near Queenston. The power house, situated in the gorge, is an immense structure which would hide the American gorge if placed in front of it. It contains 9 units, of total capacity 4,550,000 h. p. Power was first developed in December, 1921.

Mr. Malcolm S. McLeod sold the bulk of his large crop this spring at 90c a bushel delivered in Montague, but a number of growers have not yet shipped. Some are holding for higher prices.

NEWS FROM CHINA.—The Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions at New York has been advised of the safety of its missionaries in southeastern Shantung, China, where Dr. W. F. Seymour of the board's hospital at Tsinning, was shot to death. Among the missionaries at Tsinning was Miss Mary Stewart of Enmore, Prince Edward Island. "Soldier shot Dr. Seymour through the heart," said a cable to the board from the Presbyterian China Council at Shanghai. "All others in Tsinning saved. Will leave as soon as possible."

LOBSTERING — These are busy days especially on the East end of the Island shore since early Thursday morning, 26th, when the fishermen began getting out their traps and gear, each one endeavouring to get the better of the other in securing for himself the best grounds for setting. 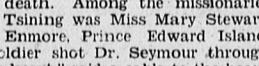

### The Public Forum

### GOVERNMENT FINANCING

Sir,—It is admitted on all sides that the people of P. E. I. are experiencing prosperity at the present time. It is also admitted that the people are indulging in luxury spending and in some cases their expenditures undoubtedly lean towards extravagance. This being so the people are now financially able to bear an increase in taxation. But what is being done by those insidious and crafty animals called statesmen and politicians whose councils are directed to peace-making—they are raising money on loan for the execution of work which by no stretch of imagination can be looked upon as loan expenditure—to wit the gravelling of the roads of this province, but clearly annually recurrent expenditure and correctly chargeable to current revenue.

Both political parties in this Province are pondering to the public on the question of taxation. It is a fact that the people of P. E. I. are the least taxed in the whole Dominion of Canada and can well afford to pay the increase in taxation necessary to meet all annually recurrent expenditure. But what is the actual state of affairs. The Province is being financed by borrowings to the extent of \$742,260.32 at 31-12-27, made up as follows:

Overdraft at Bank	\$330,417.20
	13,481.94
Taxes from the public	398,360.46
Total	\$742,260.32

On which 4-1-2 to 5 per cent. interest is being paid amounting to \$31,137.58 annually, although no less a sum than nearly \$100,000 is outstanding as uncollected revenue. Both political parties should agree at all cost to cease borrowing on loan to meeting annually recurrent expenditure and to press for the recovery of outstanding arrears of revenue and reduce the overdraft at the Bank by this \$100,000 and thus save the \$5,000 a year interest paid to the Bank.

The Government of the Province should apply the principle of justice without fear or favour. It is unjust to the future generation to expend loan monies on works that will not last as long as the term of the loan, and it is equally unjust to permit certain taxpayers to fail on the consequent increase in the overdraft at the Bank.

The foregoing shows the bad financial position of this Province, but there is more than this. For instance there is not sufficient provision being made in the sinking funds to repay the outstanding loans at maturity and in order to meet the bonds at maturity it is now necessary to considerably increase the Sinking Fund Contributions as advised by successive External Auditors.

It is now in this time of prosperity to tax the people and put the finances of the Province on a sound basis. The electors of this Island are an intelligent and honest lot of people and will not object to pay their legitimate dues if the position be put clearly before them and if they feel sure that they will not object to increased taxation in these days of prosperity rather than postpone the day of reckoning in the future (which is sure to come as night follows the day)—when possibly they will not be experiencing the present prosperity and therefore be able to bar the increased taxation that will then be necessary.

Now you politicians take your courage in both hands and appeal to the intelligence and honesty of the inhabitants of the Province and I feel sure they will think all the more of you for placing the true facts before them, instead of fooling them as you are doing at present.

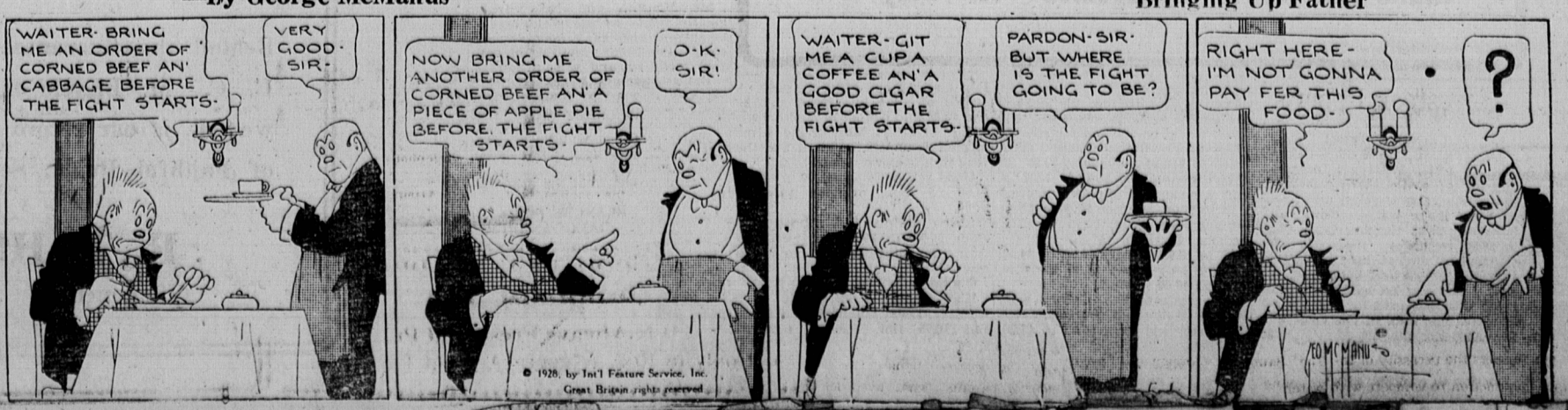
