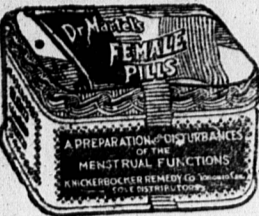

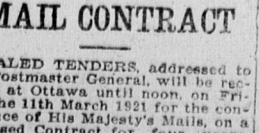

The Markets

MONTREAL, February 7.—The receipts of eggs today were 304 cases, as against 605 cases for the same day last week, and 240 cases for the corresponding day a year ago. The receipts for the week ending February 5th, 1921, were 3149 cases, as compared with 3149 cases, as compared with 3149 cases for the same week last year. The total receipts since May 1, 1920 to date were 53,711 cases, as against 707,333 cases for the corresponding period last year.

A weak feeling has prevailed in the market and prices today closed lower than the previous week. The market and prices today closed lower than the previous week. The market and prices today closed lower than the previous week.

There is no change of importance to note in the market for dressed poultry, prices for all lines have been firmly maintained, and the tendency is towards a higher level owing to the fact that supplies coming forward are not sufficient to satisfy the requirements, and in consequence cold storage stocks have had to be drawn upon, and as these are scarce, prices are likely to be a little higher than in the past.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkeys, choice 55c to 60c; Good turkeys 50c to 55c; Geese 30c to 35c; Chickens 40c to 45c; Ducks 35c to 40c; Fowls 30c to 35c.

There were no new developments in the market for potatoes today, prices being about steady with supplies ample to meet all requirements. The demand for lots is somewhat limited on account of the fact that dealers in most cases are well supplied, and trade in this respect is slow with Green Mountains and Quebec stock quoted at \$1.25 per bag of 90 lbs. extra, but on the other hand there is a good steady demand for small lots from grocers and other dealers at \$1.50 to \$1.60 per bag of 80 lbs. extra.
