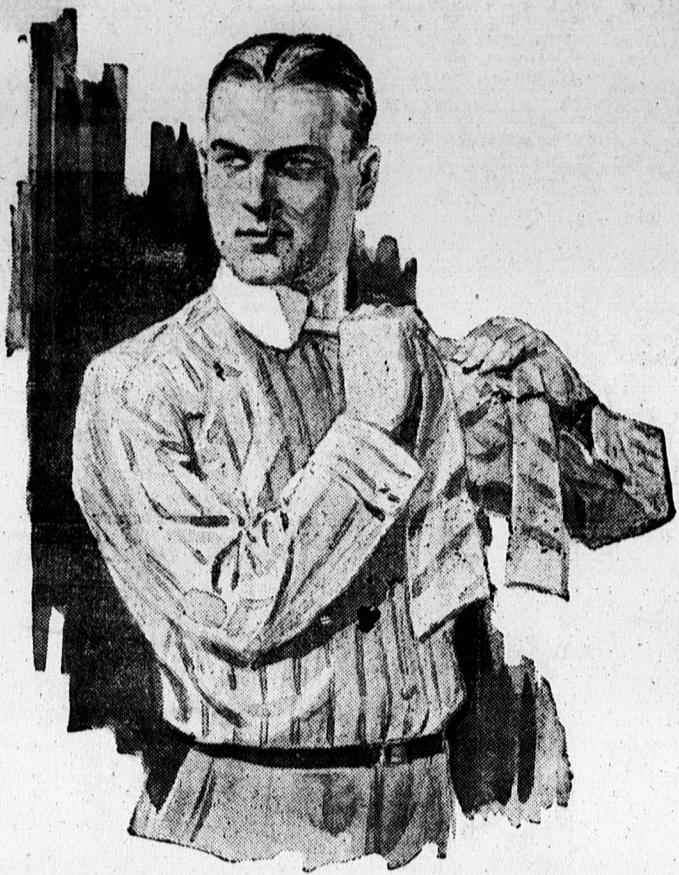

We have examined the books and vouchers of the president and treasurer of your association and find same correct, the financial condition being most gratifying. The current account bank book up to May 29th, shows a credit balance of \$62.28. Against this we find cheques issued but not presented for payments amounting to \$22.64, leaving a net balance to the credit of this account of \$39.64. The savings account bank book shows a credit balance of \$4,782.16. This amount will be further increased when the half year's interest is added, which was due on June 1st. ### Labor Federation To Fight Union

MONTREAL, June 15.—The American federation of labor in an annual convention here today declined to lend any support or effort to the Soviet Government. Russia after a two hour warm bitter debate. Defenders of Bolshevism were routed and crushing defeated when the convention overwhelmingly voted not to demand of the United States Government lifting of the blockade against Russia and the recognition of the Soviet Government. The federation was on record as opposed to "Lenine regime," on the ground that it is not representative of the Russian people but is merely a military autocracy that has so far as to establish industrial slavery.
