RELIGIOUS SERVICES

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

The services at the Central Christian Church yesterday were conducted by the pastor Rev. A. C. Cooper, Th.M.

The subject for the morning was "Christ's School" Text Matt. 11:29, "Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me."

Jesus brings this message to his disciples after having reviewed the fate of Chorazin and Capernaum. They would not receive divine instruction and he sets Himself up as the Teacher of mankind who has received his message from God and has revealed God the Father to mankind.

The Teacher then suggests in his teachings that the people have borne another yoke than His. Mankind has been burdened by many yokes and there is the consciousness of a great weight of neglect upon the shoulders of the thinking individual.

The Master teacher then taught His disciples that His school was for the slow plodding individual. Intellectual attainment did not count while it was no hindrance to enter the divine seminary.

Our experiences of life is the school in which we are trained to appreciate God and enter into fellowship and understand his plans for our lives.

Subject: "Your Talent." Text Matt. 25:25, "I was afraid and went and hid Thy talent in the earth."

God has given to men many talents, which vary in degree, extent and importance. The servant who took his talent from his lord implied his own responsibility for it. And so with the kingdom of Jesus, the seed has been sown and watched and harvested for more than two thousand years. We cannot be utterly satisfied, but we may be encouraged by the harvests and as we contemplate the amazing things that the gospel has done, we may look with hope for the day in which not only the easy and expected successes may be granted in full measure, but of the difficult hill-sides and the climbing heights, we may be able to find the handful of corn on the top of the mountain.

The child's body was recovered later from the ruins, terribly charred and mutilated, the face and limbs burned away and only the body remaining.

Eleanor was the youngest but one of a family of nine.

An investigation of the tragedy was held by Coroner Dr. J. Champion, O'Leary, and R. C. M. P. Constables Strong and Hay. It was decided an inquest was unnecessary.

The bereaved parents and family will have province wide sympathy in their harrowing loss.

Government Issues Plea To Republic

Toledo had related Fascists were storming the city but that the Government forces were resisting from battlements behind Toledo's entrances.)

MADRID, Sept. 27—(C.P.—Havas) —The Lefist Government, in a back-to-the-wall plea, called tonight on the entire Republic to rally to the defence of this capital.

"The Government wishes to hide nothing from the public," the statement said. "That is why we feel it is our duty to inform our people that the enemy, profiting from the superiority which he enjoys by virtue of arms furnished by foreign powers—arms which signify anticipated payment with several slices of our territory—is now making a supreme effort to draw near this republican capital, which remains the heart of the fight against Fascism."

The communique declared all other efforts must now be subordinated to defending the capital.

"The defence of Madrid must be organized to take care of all eventualities, in order that we may not be surprised. The city must be converted into an impregnable fortress against which the unleashed ambitions of the Fascist traitors will be crushed forever."

TOLEDO, Spain, Sept. 27—(A.P.) —The insurgent forces stormed Toledo today, hurling trained shock troops against the barricaded gates protecting the north side of the city.

Picked men, lugging machine guns, ran up the slopes in an effort to blast Government defenders from battlements behind the city's entrances. Infantrymen charged with them, pitching hand grenades into the Government positions.

The city's defenders fought back stubbornly but the insurgent commanders predicted they would be completely demoralized and easily routed as soon as the fighting came to close quarters.

The city's civilian population, foreseeing the fighting, were prepared in advance and a stream of fugitives appeared on the road to Madrid.
