**Historic Gun-Carriage Will Bear Field Marshal's Body**

(Special to the Guardian)

LONDON, Feb. 2.—When the body of Field Marshal Earl Haig, who commanded the mightiest army Great Britain ever mustered, is taken to Westminster Abbey on Friday, it will be borne on a historic gun-carriage—the carriage of the gun which fired the first British shell in the Great War, and the one that was used at the burial of the "Unknown Soldier".

War widows and battle-maimed men truged in the slow column which moved through St. Column's Church tonight past the Field Marshal's shell. All day long and until late at night, thousands of men, women and children filed past the flag-draped coffin guarded by tall, smartly uniformed soldiers, whose heads were bowed, with hands resting on the hilts of inverted sabres.

In the solemn throng which paid farewell homage to the war chief many were weeping, many brought bouquets of red poppies—memorials of the terrible gallant Flanders fighting, and emblem of the beloved Field Marshal's tireless efforts to aid the war's victims who still survive.

The Island Government holding no lands from the Crown, and consequently enjoying no revenue from that source for the construction and maintenance of local works, it is agreed that the Dominion Government pay, in half-yearly instalments, and in advance, to the Government of Prince Edward Island \$45,000 per annum, less five per cent, upon any sum not exceeding \$800,000, that the Dominion Government may advance to the Island Government for the purchase of lands now held by large proprietors.

In consideration of the transfer to the General Parliament of the powers of taxation, the following sums shall be paid yearly by Canada to Prince Edward Island for the support of its government and legislature, to wit \$30,000, and an annual grant, equal to eighty cents per head of the population, as shown by the Census returns of 1921, subsequent decennial Census, until the population amounts to 400,000, at which rate the grants shall remain, it being understood that the next Census be taken in the year 1931.

The Dominion Government will assume and defray all the charges for the following services, viz:

- A. The salary of the Lieutenant Governor.
- B. The salaries of the Judges of the Supreme Court and District or County Courts, when established.
- C. The charges in respect to the Department of Customs.
- D. The Postal Department.
- E. The protection of the Fisheries.
- F. The provision for the Militia of the Light House, ship-wreck crews, Quarantine and Marine Hospitals.
- H. The Geological Survey.
- I. The Penitentiary.
- J. Efficient Steam Service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Intercolonial Railway and the Railway System of the Dominion.
- K. The maintenance of Telegraphic Communication between the Island and the Mainland.

And such other charges as may be incident to and connected with the services which, by the "British North America Act, 1867," appertain to the General Government, and as are or may be allowed to the other Provinces.

8. The population of Prince Edward Island having been increased by 15,000, or upwards, since 1921, it is agreed that the Island shall be represented in the Dominion House of Commons by six members. The representation to be re-adjusted, from time to time, under the provisions of the "British North America Act, 1867."

9. The Constitution of the Executive authority and of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act, continue as they exist at the union until altered under the authority thereof, and the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island existing at the date of the union, shall, unless sooner dissolved, continue for the period for which it was elected.

10. The provision in the aforesaid "British North America Act, 1867," shall, except those parts thereof which are in terms made, or by reasonable intendment may be held to be specially applicable to, and only affect one and not the whole of the Provinces now composing the Dominion, and except so far as the same may be varied by these resolutions, be applicable to Prince Edward Island in the same way, and to the same extent, as they apply to the other Provinces of the Dominion, and as if the Colony of Prince Edward Island had been one of the Provinces originally united by the said Act.

11. The Railways under contract and in course of construction for the Island Government shall be the property of Canada.

**MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 2.—Extreme dullness again marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today, owing to the continued indifferent attitude of foreign buyers. A feature of the domestic grain trade was the increased demand that developed from both local and outside buyers for Argentine corn which resulted in a fairly active business. Supplies on spot have been reduced considerable and in consequence a stronger feeling prevailed and prices were advanced. Sales of car lots of bushel with sales of car lots at \$1.03 to \$1.04 per bushel ex-store. There was also some trading in car lots of oats for all shipment from Fort William. The trade in Spring and Winter wheat grades of flour continued slow, but prices were unchanged.

There was some inquiry from United States buyers for Millfeed and sales of several cars of Manitoba hay were made for February shipment. The local trade was fair and prices were firm.
