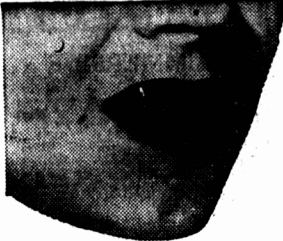

MONTREAL, June 18 (CP)—Bernard Bissonnault, who was arrested two months ago on charges of taking part in a sugar and butter counterfeit coupon printing ring, was ordered today by Judge Amedee Monet to pay a fine of \$5,000 or spend two years in penitentiary. Mrs. Bissonnault, convicted of having acted as her husband's agent in disposing of the fake coupons, was fined \$1,000 or six months in jail. The pair was arrested by the R.C.M.P. here in the basement of a house where a large quantity of printing equipment and paper used in printing bogus coupons was found.

T.C.A. Announces Appointment of London Manager

MONTREAL, June 18—Keeping pace with the rapid growth of the Canadian Government Trans-Atlantic air service, operated by Trans-Canada Air Lines, a new position of district traffic manager, London, England, has been created by T.C.A. effective immediately. Graem S. Gibson, formerly traffic representative of the company at Vancouver has been named to occupy the new post. T.C.A. is now operating five trans-Atlantic flights weekly in each direction, between Montreal and Prestwick, Scotland, and it is expected the service will be increased to six flights weekly about July 1st. Mr. Gibson has had long experience in passenger transportation. He was passenger manager, Royal Mail Steam Packet Company from 1924 to 1936 and then operated his own travel agency for three years, later joining Trans-Canada in 1939 as traffic representative. He is well acquainted with territory in the United Kingdom as he served overseas from Dec. 1939 to the end of 1944 with the Canadian Army. Upon discharge in 1945 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, Mr. Gibson resumed his former duties with T.C.A.
