marketing machinery, transportation, storage and other (items, vegetables in the market cannot possibly be as fresh as those in the home garden and freshness is the principal factor in quality vegetables.

People who have never eaten homegrown vegetables do not know their quality. Sweet corn, peas and lettuce are never at their best quality except when gathered within an hour or so of being gathered from the garden, particularly corn and peas.

The quality of freshness is particularly important in the vegetable diet of babies and small children, the vitamins and minerals which make the vegetables so essential in their diet for healthy
