# ACADIA WINS TRACK AND FIELD MEET

## Valley College Athletes Regain Championship In Close Competition

WOLFVILLE, N. S., May 19—Maritime Intercollegiate track and field honors of the year were being sported by Acadia University in this Valley town today.  
Taking nine first-places in 18 events of the annual competition held here yesterday, powerful Acadia athletes were just able to nose out a hefty New Brunswick gang in team honors by winning the mile relay, the last event.  
Before the final race, Acadia was but 1-2 point ahead of Mount Allison University, last year's champions. The final point standing of the five Maritime universities competing was: Acadia 87 1-2; Mount Allison, 59; University of New Brunswick, 19 1-2; St. Francis Xavier, 6; Dalhousie, 1.

TORONTO, May 19—Sally Fuller, fleet little filly from the Waterloo Stable of Edward Seagram, has wettied the score for the defeats she suffered in her brief career as a maiden.  
In much the same company that last year kept her lagging far behind in the dust, the stout-hearted daughter of Judge Fuller and South Shore swept to an unexpected victory in the 16th running of the King's Plate, feature turf attraction in Canada. It was the 20th triumph for the once-powerful Seagram string since the classic was first established in 1880, and brought to the winner more than \$4,000 with the 50 guineas donated with the cup by the King.

Pie Traynor and Babe Herman both took a turn at playing first base after Gus Suhr failed to get a hit in three times at bat. The Babe had one error and one putout but Pie Traynor didn't have a play.

A home run with two on by Lou Chiozza in the third inning and more than eight innings of shutout relief pitching by Sylvester Johnson, who fanned 10, gave the Philadelphia Phillies a second straight victory over the Cubs at Chicago 3-2 and the series two games to one.  
Lon Warneke who pitched nine hit balls, was the victim, suffering his second 1935 defeat as against four victories. Cincinnati's Watkins and Johnson were on base as a result of singles when Chiozza hit his home run.

Dizzy Dean, pitching despite a slight knee injury, turned in his fifth victory of the season today as the world champion Cardinals defeated Boston Braves 7-3 in their series finale before 12,000 Sunday fans.

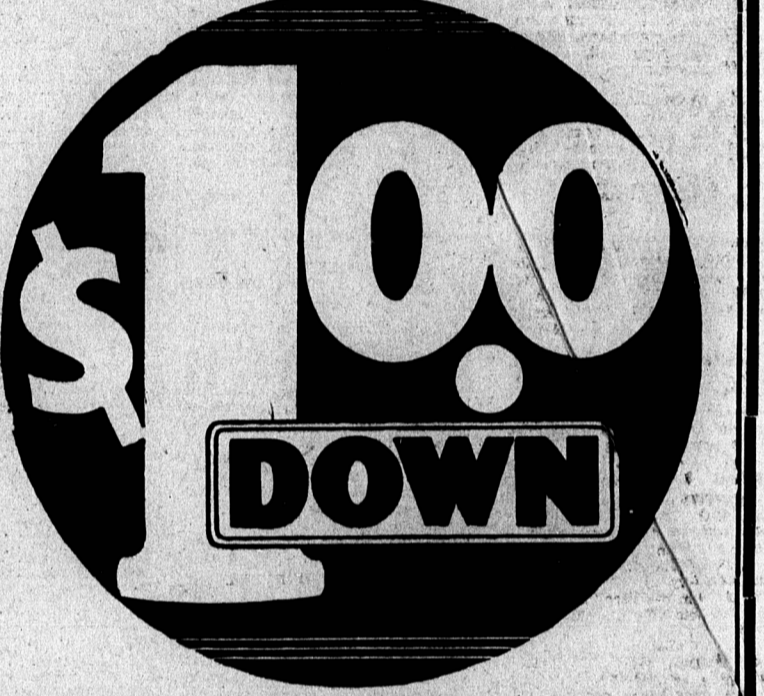
## AN. MEETING HOLY REDEEMER TENNIS CLUB

It was also decided to secure four racquets, which would be the property of the Club, and which could be rented for a small sum to any member who did not find it convenient to purchase a new racquet. The suggestion was introduced by Mr. Morrissey, who was heartily supported in the matter by Mr. James Coyle Jr. Both suggestions were unanimously adopted.  
It was also decided this year that volleyball and tennis should be operated under two separate heads, the second vice-president of the Club having charge of volleyball.  
The election of officers for the coming year, who were nominated by a nominating committee composed of Miss Melvina Richard, Mr. Joseph Beardon and Mr. Emmett MacDonald, resulted as follows:

Advisory Committee—Messrs. Jas. Coyle Jr., Alfred Doucette, and Miss Elizabeth Connors.  
This slate of officers was unanimously adopted.  
The retiring officers each thanked the members of the Club for their kind and loyal co-operation in the various activities which had been undertaken throughout the year. They pledged their continued support in every undertaking of the Club during the coming year.  
A hearty vote of thanks to the retiring officers was moved by Mr. James Coyle Jr., seconded by Mr. Ivan Berrigan, and unanimously adopted.  
The new Honorary President, Rev. Father Fisher, on being called upon, expressed his great pleasure at the honor which had been conferred upon him. He was always interested in the sporting activities of a parish and knew that great benefits were derived from such organizations. Since it was the wish of the Rector, Rev. Father Fleming, that he should take over this office, he would do everything in his power to help out the Club in its various undertakings.  
Mr. Pius Callaghan, the new President of the Club, on taking the chair voiced his appreciation and thanks to the members for having chosen him as their President. He would do his utmost to follow in the successful footsteps of his predecessor. He was sure that the members of the Club would co-operate with him and would do their part towards promoting the welfare of the Club.  
By so doing, he was certain that the Club would succeed and prosper as it had in the past.  
The other officers elected each voiced their appreciation and thanks, and pledged their wholehearted interest in the various activities of the Club.

By winning, the Indians returned to second place in the standing while the Yanks dropped to third.  
Ruffing, who gave only six hits and fanned eight, had the edge up to the final inning. Willis Kamm led off with his third single. Lou Berger got credit for a hit when Red Rolfe and Bill Dickey collided going after his bunk. Mills Gabel, batting for Everett, drew a pass to load the bases and another pinch-hitter, Bruce Campbell, drove a long fly to Chapman that scored Kamm with the only run.
