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Tigers Increase League Lead; Yankees Beat Sox

In his major league career and with Frank (Stubby) Overmire spacing seven hits and driving in two runs, the American League leading Detroit Tigers cut off Cleveland Indians 5-1 yesterday, sweeping a three-game series.

Detroit tagged Jim Bagby, Cleveland starter, for nine hits in six innings, scoring once in each of the first three frames and twice on Overmire's single in the sixth. Overmire had a five-hit shutout until the ninth, when ex-Tiger Don Ross singled to left, followed by an infield out and scored on Myril Hoar's single to left.

At Boston, Dave Ferriss, Red Sox pitcher here, was battered from the mound for the first time in his major league career and New York Yankees, only team to beat him previously, triumphed 14-4.

Ferriss, who won eight straight before being stopped by the Yanks two weeks ago, had allowed only two hits when the Dubs burst in the fifth. He was clouted for five hits and nine runs before being relieved and the Yanks went on to win 13 times in three frames, coming within one run of their own league record for most runs scored in a game.

Walk Dubiel breezed along with a two-hitter until the eighth when he was relieved by Jimmie Bush's Texas league single scoring two of the runners.

Cards Stacked Against Busher For Saturday's Race

ARODIA, Calif., June 21 (AP)—The cards are stacked against Busher, probably filly favorite, in the eighth running of the \$50,000 Santa Anita Derby Saturday, which looms as the hottest three-year-old free-for-all in the history of the track.

Only two favorites—He Did in 1936 and Porter's Cap in 1941—have won previous Anita Derbies.

Only one filly, Cleo in 1939—has ever triumphed in the race.

However, supporters of the Louis B. Mayer filly argue, there never has been a gelding who has won in the Derby. They think the filly may even go so far as to duplicate the unique double scored by Stagehand in 1938—victory in both the Derby and the \$100,000 handicapped a week later.

The winner will receive \$38,125 and a gold cup. The filly may be Busher, but it could be any one of five rugged colts: Sea Sovereign, East Effort, Checkershall or By-meabout.

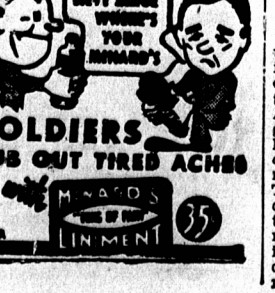
If any other horse sneaks in, he probably will replace Sweedie, 1940 winner at 23 to 1, as the Derby's best rewarder.

Special Dominion Day Service In Westminster Abbey

LONDON, June 21 (CP Cable)—The King and Queen are expected to attend a special Dominion Day service to be held at Westminster Abbey. The service will be on July 2, the date on which the holiday will be observed as July 1 falls on Sunday this year.

A parade of Canadian army, navy and air force men and women at which Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, will take the salute, will precede the service. The march will end at the Abbey from which point Roman Catholic service men and women will continue to Westminster Cathedral for a special Mass.

Ministry of Information exhibition, "Meet Canada," opens in London July 2 after touring the principal cities of England and Scotland for a year. The opening will be marked by a special Dominion Day ceremony.

Liberated Paris Barter Shrewdly On Black Market

PARIS, June 20 (CP)—Parisians call it the System D. The tag, taken from the untranslated word "devoiler," simply means keeping alive by fair means in a country whose economy has been shot to pieces and whose citizens are working with little or no co-operation to grab the essentials of life for themselves.

The System reached full flower with tender nourishment from the black market. But it developed with the aid of sheer ingenuity, ingenious contacts and a keen instinct for driving a good bargain.

Probably there is not a single resident of Paris who does not have something to do with the black market. There's some attempt at rationing and price control, but the results and enforcement are grudgingly inadequate.

Take for example Mme. Durand, who has a husband, two growing children and herself to provide for. If she's going to feed her family legitimately (on the basis of ration tickets) she can buy 12 ounces of meat a week; 16 pounds of potatoes a month; 12 ounces of fish a month; four ounces of cheese (if available) and equally small amounts of vegetables, all of it available. The "if" is very important because much of the supply goes directly to the black market.

Newspapers scream against the "marble noir" and there are occasional demonstrations in the streets. But it is more profitable for the storekeeper to operate under the System D than to starve. Maritime Timber Officials In U. K.

LONDON, June 20 (CP Cable)—Hon. J. H. MacQuarrie, Nova Scotia Minister of Lands, Forests and Municipalities and three members of the Maritime Timber Bureau have arrived in the United Kingdom to discuss timber trade prospects with British and Canadian officials.

The Maritime Bureau has met Canadian trade officials and are going to Bristol tomorrow for meetings with members of the British Timber Control. On Friday they are meeting a special committee appointed by the Timber Trade Federation of the United Kingdom, consisting of representatives of agents and importers.

In addition to Mr. MacQuarrie the party consists of J. D. Hickman, chairman of the Maritime Timber Bureau; C. J. Hawkins, chairman of the Bureau's grading committee; and Stanley Cumming, secretary-manager of the Bureau.

Hon. F. W. Pirie, New Brunswick Minister of Lands and Mines, planned to accompany the mission but was unable to make the trip. The Maritime Bureau expect to remain in Britain about three weeks.
