STRESS PLACED ON LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION

The following communication has been received from the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

The present depressed prices of all commodities, particularly those of agriculture, emphasize the wisdom of Prince Edward Island farmers adhering more closely to a policy of livestock production in addition to one good cash crop. This system of farming has proven the most successful, and all agricultural countries that have generally adopted livestock as a basic industry, have enjoyed a continuous measure of prosperity. Specialists in grain and vegetable growing may strike periods of inflated values when greater returns may be secured, but in periods of depression, single crop farmers frequently find themselves in serious financial difficulties, such as a portion of Western Canada is at present experiencing. If the Western Canadian farmers at the present time possessed a fair amount of beef, dairy cattle and hogs, they would be able to obtain fair values for the same by marketing them in this manner, and no doubt their present experience will teach an increased number the necessity of establishing a system of mixed farming. Dairy cattle, hogs and poultry have in the past proven to be suitable and profitable lines for our Island farmers to follow and although the quantity of beef at present in storage in Canada, is large, the number of dairy cows has been so greatly reduced, principally on account of the high wheat prices prevailing for the past three years, that we will require to import a considerable quantity of butter before the dairy cows are again placed on the grass, and with grain and mill-feed at the present very low values, and with hog prices maintaining a level of from ten to eleven cents a pound, dairying and hog production under the circumstances, promises a fair return for those who are in a position to market their low priced feeds in this manner.

The all-year round dairyman has a monthly cheque wherewith to meet his continuous expenses; a crop of hogs can be marketed every six or seven months and the returns from farm values may be continuous. Efficient and successful producers of dairy hogs and poultry products find that rarely ever have the prices of such animal products fallen below profitable productive values. There is, however, a great variation in the profits secured in the production of butter, hogs and poultry products during the winter months, and while it has been found most profitable to manufacture in winter, the heavy producing crops grown in summer, yet it is most necessary that the class of animals used in the transformation of these feeds into a higher product, be especially of the kind that are, through years of careful breeding, the most suitable and profitable for this purpose. It is necessary also that the animals be kept in a warm stable, as it is economically unsound to consider heating an animal internally by feeding sufficient food in addition to that required for maintenance to preserve the warmth of the body.

While many farmers are financially unable to provide modern frost-proof buildings, old structures may be made frost-proof at little cost, by providing a second wall with frost-proof filling of saw-dust or other suitable material. The most important consideration, however, that has the greatest bearing on the profit secured from the production of butter or eggs, will be found in the class of animal used for this purpose, as there is a great variation existing in the productive qualities of dairy cows and laying poultry, and while it is possible to obtain a fair measure of profit in feeding grain, clover hay and roots to the high-producing dairy cow, it will be found disappointing business to attempt winter dairying with low producing animals. This does not mean that it is necessary for every farmer to obtain pure-bred cattle as good producing grades of different pure-bred breeds are found also to be most suitable and profitable for this work, and we are surprised to discover the number of men who are satisfied to use low producing mongrel cattle, as the annual loss incurred in feeding farm crops to

such, would go a long way towards the purchase of a profitable class of animals.

The excuse frequently given by the farmer using inferior stock is to the effect that he does not intend to follow specialized dairying. He must realize that if he or his sons continue to farm for the next twenty years they will be keeping cows, hogs and poultry of some class, and, regardless of the number maintained on a farm, those that are kept should be of a high producing calibre. The greatest animal loss sustained by livestock farmers is through keeping an unsuitable class of animals for the purpose intended, whether this be for the production of beef and milk, or feeding improperly balanced rations, as a complete ration of hay or hay and roots, without grain, would prove to be, June grass constitutes the cheapest and most complete ration for the dairy cow. A good substitute however, may be composed of hay and roughage-roots for succulency and grain supplemented with mill-feed to supply the protein necessary. Feeding sufficient of this winter ration, dairy cattle will milk fully as heavily, as they would on the best June grass, if suitable stabling is provided and the ration fed in proper amounts. An animal going into winter quarters in good condition is said to be half wintered, meaning in proper condition, and it will require a smaller quantity of food to maintain a high than a low condition.

Considering the amount of feed grown in this Province that is fed to farm animals, we believe that the greatest loss occurs because of the fact that most of this feed is used mainly for maintenance, and to this extent largely wasted, while an additional amount of properly balanced ration with the roughage fed, would secure continued growth in the young animal, or sufficient production in the dairy cow to secure a profit. Cash crops will continue to fluctuate in price in the future as they have in the past. The plunger in potatoes and wheat may secure an odd year of satisfactory profit, but the risk of a continuity of favourable returns from his farm will be more than that obtained from livestock, and we are strongly of the opinion that there should be sufficient livestock kept on every farm in this Province to consume all the hay, grain and roots grown, from the use of fertilizers to grow potato crop. A reasonable acreage of potatoes grown from year to year, with livestock as a basis, will prove the soundest policy for our farmers to follow and we strongly advise those who are in a position to do so, to secure foundation breeding animals of the best and most suitable strains, at the earliest possible moment, as there is sure to be an increased demand for dairy cattle from the re-action that is certain to follow the present depression of price, as day follows night.

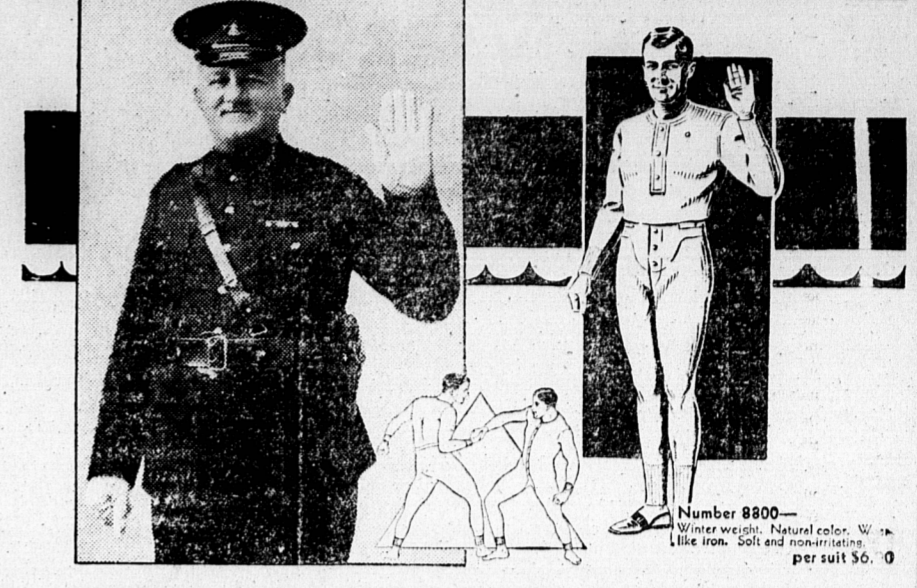
