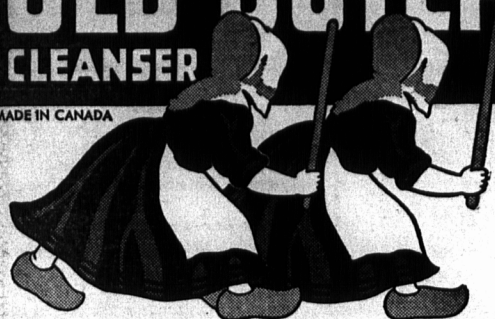

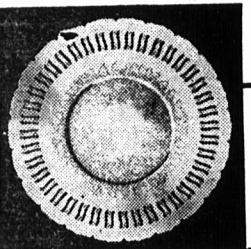

## Ill Wind Of War Blows Good To Many Refugees

(By Andrus Harding, Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The war is an ill wind blowing good to thousands of refugees from greater Germany who received permission to enter the United States temporarily and now may be permitted to stay permanently. Their exact number is not known. Some officials place it in the neighborhood of 10,000. Several months ago President Roosevelt hinted he might ask Congress for special legislation to take care of the people who had come to the United States on visitors' permits and then, as Hitler's campaign against the Jews and others got under way, found they had no country to which they could return. Meaningless, their temporary permits have been extended. With the coming of the war, refugees have been able to leave Germany for the United States only in dribs and drabs. Their departure is hedged by many new restrictions. And the neutral countries through which they must travel will accept them only if they are able to show a steamship ticket to the United States. This has given officials here an opportunity to transfer to the German refugees temporarily here the visas refugees now in greater Germany are unable to utilize. Greater Germany, including Austria, is entitled to 27,370 quotas per year, plus more than 2,800 for Czechoslovakia and more than 6,500 for Poland, a total of approximately 37,000. This total is a sponge more than large enough to soak up the temporary German visitors here.

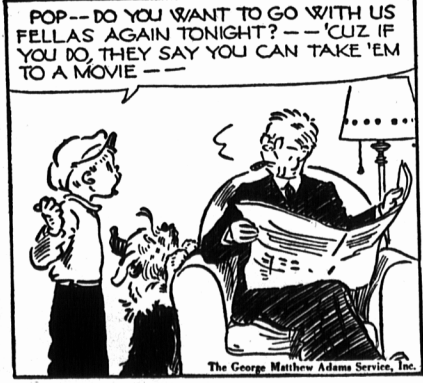

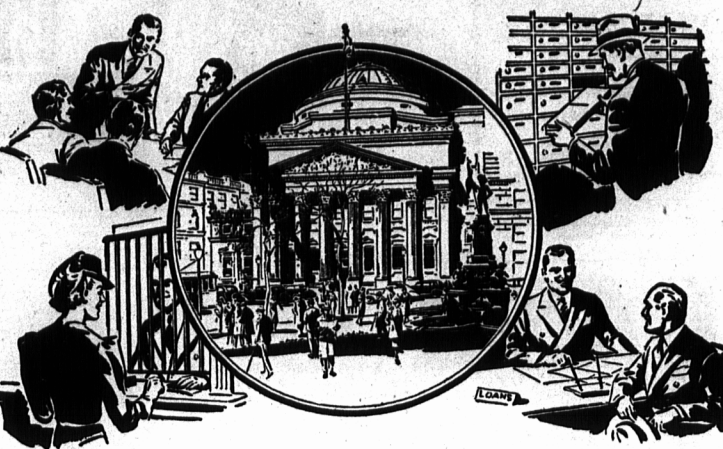
## Numerous Issues Confront Electors In U. S. Contests

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Old age pensions, pari-mutual betting, prohibition and a few contests directly involving President Roosevelt's policies confront the voters with a miscellany of issues in tomorrow's nation-wide elections. To complicate still further the task of discerning national trends this hodge-podge of questions is blanketed with a crazy-quilt of local issues almost as numerous as the candidates themselves. But while mayoral elections in several cities may provide some indications of national sentiment, national interest is fastened first of all upon the question of old age pensions. In two states, California and Ohio, the issue is up for settlement by referendum. The California voters are called upon to make a "yes" or "no" decision upon a variant of the "ham and eggs" plan which they rejected last year. The current plan would give \$30 each Thursday to unemployed persons over 50. The payment would be made in state scrip redeemable after a year provided a two-cent stamp were attached every week. The Ohio old age pension campaign is led by Herbert Bigelow, Cincinnati clergyman. It calls for payments, supplementing other income to guarantee \$50 monthly to retired and \$80 to couples. It would be financed by a state income tax and a levy upon high priced real estate. The pari-mutual referendum is in New York. The prohibition question arises in rural Indiana. Towns electing town officials. The dry forces have concentrated on candidates who will oppose the issuance of local liquor licenses. The issue of Roosevelt policies is remotely present in a gubernatorial election in Kentucky and the election of a mayor in Philadelphia.

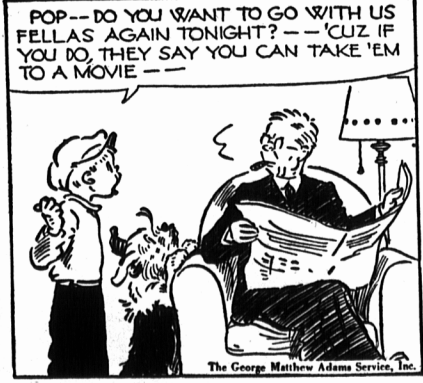
