Bathrobe Cord In Evidence At Murder Trial

MONTREAL, May 12 (CP) — A gaily colored bathrobe cord which the Crown said, was used to strangle Madeleine DesRochers was produced today in evidence at the opening of the murder trial of Paul H. Laplante, 46, of Shawinigan Falls, Que.

Laplante is charged with the killing of the 37-year-old Montreal stenographer last February in a room at the Ford Hotel where they had registered, as Mr. and Mrs. Laplante.

Irene Lagarde, chief Crown prosecutor, told the King's Bench Court jury the Crown would attempt to prove that Laplante struck Miss DesRochers on the head with a bottle, attempted to strangle her with his hands, then used the bathrobe cord.

He then had left a message addressed to "radio police" which contained his name and address. Laplante was arrested at his home where he lives with his wife and family.

Dr. Rosario Fontaine, medical expert, testified that death occurred two or three days before the body was found by a chambermaid Feb. 28. Death was due to strangulation by the bathrobe cord, he said, aided by a prior attempt at strangulation by hand.

Miss DesRochers was three months pregnant, the doctor added.

The case is continuing.

Mrs. Chester Simpson and Mrs. Roy Woodside sang by request. "The Old Rugged Cross." The choir joined in the chorus. Rev. C.J. Crockett conducted the service.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful including wreaths from Newport, Windsor, Cheverie and St. Croix. Mr. Champion leaves to mourn the loss of one who gave special promise, her husband Edison C. Champion, her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph C. Tracy, one brother, Cecil, and three sisters, Barbara, Deloris and Carolyn, all at home.

The pallbearers were George Harvey of Brooklyn, William Woodside, Ivan Dickleson, Charles Hickey, George Wall and Jack Champion. Interment was in the Malpeque cemetery.

N. S. Legislature Stands Adjourned

HALIFAX, May 12 (CP) — The second session of Nova Scotia's 48th Legislature adjourned to an unspecified future date today shortly after Premier Angus L. Macdonald, announcing the Government is ready to begin negotiating a financial agreement with the Dominion, provided a bang-up finale to the six-weeks sitting.

It brought to an end an important period of law-making in which members made changes in statutes dealing with labor relations, fishermen's bargaining rights, agriculture and many other phases of provincial activity.

The House was adjourned to meet again at the call of the Speaker.

Premier Macdonald said there "will be some time spent in making an agreement but when it is reached the House will reassemble."

He told reporters it would likely be sometime this summer — a rare time for meeting in the recent history of the Nova Scotia House.

Earlier Chief Justice Sir Joseph Chisholm, acting as administrator of the Province during the illness of Lieutenant Governor H.E. Kendall, gave Royal assent to 60 bills. A similar number received assent a week ago.

The Premier, in a 6,000-word speech, told the House the government had won most of its goals as set out in a Dec. 5, 1946, letter to the Federal Government, and "our view is that we should now indicate our readiness to negotiate an agreement with the Dominion."

Budgets For Surplus

Earlier in the session, the Premier had introduced a \$22,400,000 budget which predicted a \$122,000,000 surplus with no allowance being made for additional revenue from a Dominion-Provincial agreement.

and without imposing new taxation.

The Legislature convened March 26 in the midst of the still-continuing strike of 18,000 miners which tied up virtually all provincial pits Feb. 15.

Two days before session opening, a three-month-old walkout of Nova Scotia deep-sea fishermen had been called off. At the same time, the Province was facing new problems in lengthening unemployment rolls.

Major items of legislation introduced included a new trade union act designed to allow the Province to re-assume jurisdiction from Federal authorities in labor relations Thursday. The act, which supersedes the 1937 act by which the Province became first to recognize trade unions, provides for "conciliation, mediation and arbitration of industrial disputes," and for establishment of a labor relations board.

The Act provides that no strike vote may be taken or strike called until efforts of a conciliation officer or board has failed and 14 days elapsed from the time a minister has been made to the minister. It took no stand on closed shops.

The bill, besides meeting criticism from Opposition members, was termed disappointing by two Government members, J.E. Rutledge (L—Halifax Centre) and Henry Hicks (L—Annapolis). Both members, agreeing with the bill as far as it went, thought it did not go far enough.

Amendment was made to the Fishermen's Federation Act so as to provide for bargaining units to be known as county stations. The Act will be administered by an inspector to be appointed by the Governor-in-council.
