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UNITED STATES TO THROW FORCE OF 2000 MEN INTO NICARAGUA TO PROTECT LIVES AND PROPERTY OF FOREIGNERS

Won 83 Of 150 Points And 11 Of 17 Firsts—A Fine Evening's Sport

Upwards of two thousand people were afforded an unusually fine afternoon's sport at the Abegweit grounds yesterday evening, the occasion being the 25th annual championships of the M. P. A. A. under the auspices of the Abegweit A.A.

The Abegweits are accustomed to making a complete success of anything they undertake in enterprises in which the public are concerned and in this instance the only exception to this was an excess on the part of the large number of competitors—over forty—the ideal weather, splendid management, keenest of competition in every event and a good natured and orderly gathering were features which tended towards the great success attained.

Not only from a business standpoint was the ardent Abegweit satisfied. The achievement of their track and field team last night was a remarkable one, 83 points out of 150 being secured.

The Abegweits captured 11 championships, Pictou 3, Wanderers 2 and Oxford 1.

The polevaulter and high jumper were won by Len McDonald, Pictou, who gave an exhibition vault of 10 ft 6 in and all but succeeded in clearing 11 ft 1 in in trying to break W. Halpeny's record of 11 feet.
