RECRUITING IN HALIFAX FOR NAVY

The Imperial and Dominion governments have arrived at an arrangement by which Canadian young men who wish to join the British navy can do so without going to England. To do this the British government have appointed the boatswain at H. M. Dockyard as recruiting officer who will examine candidates as to their physical and educational ability, and if they pass, to be sent to England to join the training ship, to serve some years before they are allowed to go to sea as a qualified bluejacket or marine. Heretofore a Canadian had to go to England before he could be recruited, and if he was not successful in the passing of the examinations, was sent home but by being examined in Canada, if he does not come up to requirements, he does not lose so much time as if he had to go to England and happened to be rejected. A current rumor to the effect that the Dreadnaught, now at Gibraltar acting as port guardship, would come to Halifax this summer to be a guardship on this station to remain all the year round was given considerable airing. Another rumor says that she is to come as a training ship, England being anxious that Canadian young men be well represented in her navy and giving them every facility and chance by having a training ship in Halifax.

WOMEN OF THE HOUR.

Mlle Chauvan the young Frenchwoman barrister, has made her first appearance in the Paris courts. She appeared as counsel for a pointsman who was charged with neglect of duties in connection with the railway accident at Choisy-le-Roi. She argued that the amnesty law applied to the case and the court decided in her favor. The death of Queen Victoria has left Queen Wilhelmina of Holland the only woman ruler in the civilized world. Mme Sarah Bernhardt was recently asked what had been the happiest moment in her interesting life. The world famous actress is reported to have answered, without the smallest hesitation that it was when she was 17 and took the prize for reciting at the Conservatoire in Paris.
