WILLARD KITCHEN, of Fredericton, was in the city yesterday, and left last evening for home. About a week ago, Mr. Kitchen was in Prince Edward Island, where he is the contractor for the Murray Harbor Railroad branch. He says it is about completed. It is fifty miles in length, and runs from Charlottetown to Murray Harbor. A bridge on the road has not yet been completed though, although the six spans are already in place. By spring it is expected the line will be thrown open for travel. M. J. Haney, of Toronto, and Hugh McDonald, of Sydney, were the contractors for sub-structure and approaches. Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning, has been elected president of the Evangelical Alliance in succession to Rev. Dr. Lathern. Rev. Robert Murray was elected secretary and Mr. Henry Theakston, assistant secretary, at the meeting which was held on Monday afternoon. A resolution expressive of the organization's sense of loss in Dr. Lathern's death and of appreciation of his pure and beautiful character was also unanimously passed.—Halifax Chronicle.

A MEETING was held yesterday forenoon in the City Hall to consider means of providing for the poor of the city. Mayor Kelly presided and the question was discussed by a number of those present and a resolution that a committee of Clergymen from each church with delegates from St. Vincent de Paul Society, the Caledonia Club and Salvation Army be formed and that the representatives meet in the Council Chamber this morning, was unanimously carried. Dr. Jenkins was appointed chairman.

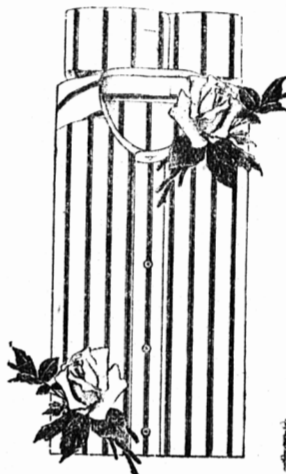
